Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- The childminder has a secure knowledge of how to safeguard children. She regularly checks her premises and removes any hazards, so children can safely explore.
- The childminder is professional and immensely enthusiastic. She provides children with an exciting variety of well-planned activities that promote their learning in all areas.
- The childminder supports children's well-being exceptionally well. She is extremely kind and caring, and children have a strong emotional attachment to her.
- The childminder has established effective partnerships with parents. She understands the benefits of working with parents and other professionals to provide children with a consistent approach to their learning.
- The quality of teaching is good. The childminder has an accurate understanding of children's developmental needs. She carefully observes children to find out what they can do and plans effectively to help them make good progress.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- The childminder offers limited opportunities for children, in particular those who prefer learning outdoors, to recognise words and print in all environments, to strengthen their early reading skills.
- The childminder does not involve the parents or children in her evaluation of practice to help identify areas for improvement.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- increase opportunities for children, particularly those who prefer to learn outdoors, to see letters and written print to extend their literacy skills further
- involve and take account of the views of parents and children to identify priorities for improvement.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed areas within the home used for childminding.
- The inspector observed interactions between the childminder and the children while they engaged in activities.
- The inspector sampled a range of documentation, including records relating to children, safeguarding procedures and feedback from parents.
- The inspector talked with the childminder and the children.
- The inspector carried out a joint observation with the childminder.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. The childminder knows the procedures to follow should she have any concerns about a child. The childminder demonstrates a secure knowledge of how children develop and effectively monitors their progress to close any gaps in their learning. As a result, children make good overall progress and develop a good range of key skills ready for school. The childminder and her assistant work in partnership together to improve their practice. They access regularly training and use this knowledge to review their teaching practice; for example, recent training has helped the childminder to improve how they plan activities using the children's ideas. The childminder has made positive changes to her setting since her last inspection.

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Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The quality of teaching is good. The childminder effectively interacts with children to challenge them in their learning. She regularly observes them as they play and accurately assesses their progress. She has a good understanding of how children typically develop and is quick to identify any gaps in their progress. The childminder and her assistant work closely together. They work with parents to suggest activities that they can do at home to extend their children's learning further. The childminder places a strong focus on helping children to develop their communication and language skills. Children learn new words rapidly and express their likes and dislikes from a young age. The childminder joins in children's play skilfully to extend their learning. She asks questions, gives children time to think and encourages them to find solutions as they play.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are outstanding

The childminder's settling-in procedures are highly successful in enabling children to form trusting relationships with her. Children have a superb time in her exceptionally warm, happy and nurturing home. Children confidently express their views and ideas, and freely make choices during play. The childminder has extremely effective practices that contribute to children living a healthy lifestyle. They benefit from daily physical activities in the fresh air and freely access the garden. The childminder extends children's awareness of their community exceptionally well, for example, as they visit local parks, shops and farms. Children develop an excellent awareness of themselves, other people and about the diverse world in which they live. Children's behaviour is very good. The childminder acts as an excellent role model, demonstrating warmth and kindness. Children learn to show great care and consideration for others.

Outcomes for children are good

Children make good progress in their learning and development from their starting points. They gain a good range of skills that prepare them for future learning and school.
