## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder knows the procedures to follow to safeguard children. She attends regular child protection training to keep up to date with current requirements.
- The childminder understands the importance of supporting children's health and well-being. She holds a current first aid qualification, has public liability insurance and recognises the importance of maintaining a safe environment.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's welfare, learning and development. She knows how to plan and provide a range of activities to help children learn and make progress.
- The childminder has a variety of easily accessible resources available for children of all ages to help them learn and develop in all areas.
- The childminder understands the need to develop partnerships with parents and others involved in children's development to promote consistency.
- Self-evaluation enables the childminder to improve her practice. She keeps up to date with relevant training and works closely with advisers and other childminders to help continue her professional development.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector viewed the environment, resources and toys available for the children to use.
- The inspector talked with the childminder about her responsibility to keep children safe and healthy.
- The inspector talked with the childminder about the activities she plans to help children learn and develop.

The childminder registered in 2011. She lives in Yeovil, Somerset. She operates for 45 weeks a year, and provides care for children before and after school every weekday and during school holidays. The childminder has an early years qualification at level 3. At the time of the inspection, there were no children in the early years on roll.
