Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is outstanding

- The highly motivated childminder provides exciting and very stimulating learning environments for children, both indoors and outdoors. They make outstanding progress in their learning and development.
- The childminder places a very strong focus on assessing children's progress to precisely monitor and narrow any gaps in their achievement.
- Parents hold the childminder in extremely high regard. They see the impact of the childminder's outstanding service in ensuring that children are cared for very effectively, have high levels of self-esteem, and that they behave exceptionally well.
- A very strong emphasis is placed on children's safety; for instance, they learn to use tools such as scissors, and practise emergency procedures and road safety.
- Children benefit by having very nutritious home-cooked food. They learn about healthy eating in different ways, such as discussions, growing vegetables, and cooking activities.
- The childminder places a very strong emphasis on monitoring her performance as well as the performance of her assistant. She has an exceedingly strong commitment to the continuous improvement of her service.
- The childminder gains knowledge on many training courses to further benefit the children and their families. For example, she has introduced activities for children to take home to enhance their literacy skills.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

■ make more use of play resources to further challenge children's imaginative learning.

- The inspector observed activities in the childminder's home, inside and in the garden.
- The inspector spoke with the childminder and children at appropriate times throughout the inspection.
- The inspector looked at children's records and planning, and discussed the childminder's self-evaluation, policies and procedures.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is outstanding

The childminder is highly organised and all required routines are very securely in place to underpin the outstanding service children and parents receive. Safeguarding is effective. The childminder places an extremely strong emphasis on children's safety and well-being. She has a very good knowledge of child protection and procedures to follow if she had concerns. The childminder works extremely well with parents and goes out of her way to provide extensive information about children's routines, learning and development. For example, she offers parents opportunities to discuss children's progress and next steps for learning in their own homes.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is outstanding

Precise planning, assessment and recording of children's achievements means that the childminder is acutely aware of what each child can do and what they need to learn next. Children are highly absorbed in learning, taking part in many well-planned activities. They make excellent progress, given their starting points. The very enthusiastic childminder uses teaching methods which inspire the children. Children develop excellent speaking and listening skills, and have a very keen interest in books, reading and writing. The childminder makes excellent use of extra resources to capture their attention skills. Children develop great imaginations through music and movement, art and crafts, and role play. However, the childminder recognises that some resources need updating to help stimulate children's learning even more. Children have fun exploring colour, number, size, shape and measurement. The childminder has long-established relationships with local early years settings and works very closely with them to complement children's early education.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are outstanding

The childminder places children at the heart of her childminding service. She provides an extremely welcoming and homely environment, which is set up to meet the needs of each child. Children are very relaxed; they know exactly what is expected of them. They play exceedingly well together. They are very polite, kind and respectful towards one another, and they are encouraged to talk about one another's feelings during their play. Children follow excellent hygiene practices and develop very good independence skills for when they start school. For example, they wash their hands, pour drinks, dress and undress themselves. Children enjoy learning about their families and local environment. They develop excellent physical skills as they are active in many different ways, including running, jumping and climbing.

Outcomes for children are outstanding

Children have a strong zest for learning. They make outstanding progress in gaining language, communication, number and physical skills, given their starting points. They are superbly prepared for the next stage in their education.
