## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder meets requirements. She knows her responsibility to keep children safe and protect them from harm. She understands child protection procedures.
- The childminder knows how children learn and develop. She understands the need to plan activities based on children's interests and individual requirements to help prepare them for school.
- The childminder knows the need to use observation and assessment to track children's learning and development. She understands the need to complete the progress check for children when between the ages of two and three years.
- The childminder has a first-aid qualification. She knows the importance of promoting children's good health and of teaching children about good hygiene routines.
- The childminder understands the need to manage children's behaviour and to help children learn to value one another and respect differences.
- The childminder has undertaken mandatory training. She understands the need to continue building on her knowledge and skills to improve her practice further.
- The childminder knows the importance of established relationships with parents to help her know and meet children's individual needs.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector held discussions with the childminder about her practice when childminding, including how she assesses children's abilities and plans for their progress.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to provide activities and learning experiences for children.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder her plans to keep children safe and healthy, how she risk assesses her premises and her methods for evaluating her provision.
- The inspector viewed and discussed a selection of the childminder's documents, including her policies and procedures.
- The inspector had a tour of the premises and checked all areas used for childminding.
