Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- Safeguarding and welfare requirements are not being met. This has a significant impact on children's safety and well-being.
- Too few children are reaching the level of development expected for their age. This means they are not well prepared for when they move on to school. Systems to measure children's learning and development are not effective.
- There is too little information shared with parents about children's learning and development.
- Not all parents know of the person that has key responsibility for their child at nursery. Information is not being gathered to make sure the staff can meet the needs of the children in their care.
- Management monitoring and supervision arrangements do not make sure that children experience good quality teaching.
- The nursery is not making sure that groups of children at risk of under-achievement make good progress in their learning and are catching up with other children of the same age.

It has the following strengths

- Staff are kind and caring. Children enjoy secure relationships with staff.
- Children behave well in the setting and have opportunities to make choices in their play.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

The recently appointed manager is inexperienced in the role. She is developing her understanding of the requirements. She acknowledges weaknesses within the provision, some of which are identified in an action plan. This is being developed in conjunction with the local authority. Safeguarding is ineffective. Staff have an insufficiently secure knowledge and understanding of child protection policies and procedures. The nursery does not ensure that information regarding vulnerable children is appropriately recorded and shared. Staff are unaware of their duty to prevent children being drawn into radicalisation and extremism. Procedures for induction and supervision are not effective; some staff are unclear about their roles and responsibilities. Opportunities for the manager and staff to improve their practice through training, coaching and mentoring are too few and this is having an impact on the overall quality of provision.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is inadequate

Summary assessments of children's progress are shared with most parents on a termly basis, but these are not in language that is easy to understand. Parents are not aware of identified next steps in their children's learning and the summaries do not contain this information. Children have opportunities to choose from a reasonable range of resources which they can access easily. Staff are friendly and supportive; they supervise children well as they play. However, the quality of teaching is too variable. Some staff lack a secure knowledge and understanding of the learning and development requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage. This means they miss too many opportunities to develop children's skills. Children, although occupied, are often not involved in purposeful play.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Key staff with responsibility for children do not ensure that they have sufficient information about children's needs prior to them starting at the nursery. Parents do not share information about their children's learning at home to help inform assessments of children's progress. Staff develop warm relationships with children which help them to feel emotionally secure within the nursery. Children generally enjoy their time at nursery. However, arrangements to support children's transition, both within the nursery and on to school, are not effective. Children eat healthy cooked meals and nutritious snacks. They play in the fresh air every day. They behave well, for example, when waiting on the mat for registration time. They have a clear understanding of the nursery's 'golden rules'. Children's attendance at nursery is clearly recorded, but staff are not always alert to the need to monitor absences to ensure children's well-being.

Outcomes for children are inadequate

Assessments of children's progress, including progress checks at age two, are not always accurate or thorough enough to ensure that gaps in children's learning and development are identified and shared with parents. There is currently no monitoring of children's progress records to ensure their quality. This means that information used by the manager to track the progress of children and identify those that need additional support is not

reliable. The information available shows that too many children are not making typical progress for their age and the reasons for this are not fully understood by the manager. The manager has not yet begun to monitor different groups of children to ensure that any differences in their achievements are identified and gaps are closed.

The Wind in the Willows Day Nursery is a privately owned nursery which registered under the current provider in 2007 and then reregistered in 2015. The nursery is on the Early Years Register and the compulsory part of the Childcare Register. It operates from an open plan setting in a purpose built facility, situated on the Water Eaton residential estate of Bletchley, close to Milton Keynes. The nursery is open each weekday from 7.30am to 6.30pm all year round, except for one week at Christmas. The nursery currently supports children with special educational needs and children who speak English as an additional language. The nursery receives funding for the provision of free early education for children aged two, three and four years. The nursery employs nine staff, plus a cook and a cleaner. Of these, seven staff including the manager hold appropriate early years qualifications and two members of staff are working towards a qualification.

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the Early Years Foundation Stage.
