Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- The provider has failed to notify Ofsted about recent changes to committee members. Consequently, the required suitability checks have not been carried out.
- The suitability of staff and committee members working with children is not adequately recorded and verified.
- Parents are not consistently encouraged by staff to share information about their children's development and what they are learning at home. Consequently, staff do not have a complete picture of children's abilities, which means that planned activities do not consistently match their learning needs as precisely as possible.

It has the following strengths

- Children are happy and settled. They are skilfully encouraged by staff to choose which activities to take part in.
- Children are encouraged to develop their independence well. They help to prepare the table for snack time and pour their own drinks.
- Staff have positive links with the host school. Teachers from reception class are invited into the nursery. Staff effectively share information with other settings about what children can do. Children are well-prepared when they move to school.
- Staff are effective in managing children's behaviour. Children learn about showing respect and tolerance to each other. They understand that they need to take turns and share favourite toys and equipment.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage the provider must:

strengthen partnership working with parents and encourage parents to share more information about what their children are learning at home.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and outdoors, and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector completed a joint observation with the nursery manager.
- The inspector held a meeting with the nursery manager and provider. She looked at relevant documentation, such as the nursery's self-evaluation and evidence of the suitability of staff working in the nursery.
- The inspector spoke to a small selection of parents during the inspection and took account of their views.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

The arrangements for safeguarding are ineffective. The setting has failed to notify Ofsted of changes to the committee members. Therefore, checks to ascertain the suitability of some members to undertake their roles have not been completed. The suitability of staff and committee members working with children is not adequately recorded. Ongoing records of Disclosure and Barring Service checks are not accurately completed. This means the suitability of staff and committee members is not fully verified. Staff are suitably qualified. They have a sound understanding of child protection issues and know what action to take should they have any potential concerns over a child. Staff carry out regular safety checks to make sure that the environment is safe and hazards minimised. Staff receive support and monitoring from the manager. The manager makes sure they have opportunity to improve their practice and keep up to date with requirements. Partnerships with parents and other settings that children attend are effective. Comprehensive and clear information about children's interests and experiences is regularly exchanged with other settings children attend.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff undertake spontaneous observations of the children and use this information to effectively organise meaningful activities and experiences. Children make good progress towards the early learning goals as these activities are challenging and help them achieve their next steps in learning. Staff provide a rich and well-resourced environment both indoors and outdoors to complement their teaching. Children enjoy lots of independent choice and opportunities to initiate their own play. Children build and create a boat with large wooden blocks. They work together as they count, compare and discuss how to construct the boat. Staff praise children's efforts to help them continue with their task and keep trying. Children show interest in choosing books or playing imaginatively in the role-play area. Children actively enjoy their learning, happily playing on their own and with others.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Children's safety and well-being are compromised due to the suitability of staff and committee members not being verified and recorded accurately. Children's understanding of healthy lifestyles is promoted well. Staff ensure children have access to fresh air on a daily basis. Staff work well with parents of children who speak English as an additional language to ensure that their individual needs are met well. Children learn about similarities and differences in their own and other cultures, beliefs and backgrounds. Children build strong attachments to staff and settle well.

Outcomes for children are good

All children, including those in receipt of funding, make good progress from their starting points. Children acquire skills, knowledge and attitudes that help prepare them well for starting school. Children are eager and motivated learners who are keen to engage in a range of activities and experiences.

Shrewsbury Cathedral Catholic Nursery registered in 1997. The nursery employs three members of childcare staff. Of these, one holds an appropriate early years qualification at level 3, and one has Early Years Professional status. The nursery opens from Monday to Friday, term time only. Sessions are from 8.45am until 11.45am and 12.15pm until 3.15pm, with a lunch club facility. The nursery supports children who speak English as an additional language.

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the Early Years Foundation Stage.
