Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- The provider has a poor understanding of her role and responsibilities. For example, she has failed to notify Ofsted of information relating to the disqualification of a member of staff. This is a breach of the legal requirements.
- Staff do not have a clear understanding of safeguarding, including the signs and symptoms that would cause concerns about children's well-being. This compromises children's welfare and is also a breach of the Childcare Register requirements.
- Staff in the toddler room do not identify hazards that arise to ensure children's safety at all times. This also applies to the requirements of the Childcare Register.
- The key-person system is ineffective. The lack of experienced staff has a negative effect on the quality of teaching and learning, and children's emotional well-being.
- Outcomes for children are poor. Staff do not use information about children's starting points to plan precisely for individual children and the next stages in their learning.
- Staff supervision, induction and training is inadequate. New staff do not follow the behaviour management policy. Self-evaluation is weak.
- Staff deployment is not managed efficiently. The provider does not ensure that all rooms consistently have senior and experienced staff who can offer guidance and support to less qualified staff. This compromises children's learning and their care.

It has the following strengths

- Children eagerly explore the activities and resources in the improved garden area.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

The provider does not have a clear understanding of her role and responsibilities and has not addressed all the actions and recommendations from the previous inspection. Safeguarding is ineffective. Some newly recruited staff lack the knowledge and skills to safeguard children adequately. Although these staff are booked to attend safeguarding training, they manage a room when senior staff are absent. This has a significant impact on children's well-being. The provider has failed to notify Ofsted of an allegation against a member of staff, although not connected to this setting. The manager has evaluated the provision and prepared an action plan; however, this is not effective as it does not identify all areas of weakness to help drive improvement, or monitor the effect of these on children's care and learning. Staff work in partnership with parents to help support children's care. They have established relationships with external agencies to help support children with additional needs when required.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is inadequate

Due to the high turnover of staff and absences due to staff sickness, those working directly with the children are not always aware of children's preferences. Staff do not make effective use of observations, assessments and information collected when children first start. Children are not supported effectively to progress to the next stages in their learning. Staff do not plan challenging activities that are suitable for the individual needs of children to aid their progress. At times, staff ask children to follow planned routines, preventing them from following their own interests and developing the concentration skills to complete tasks. Staff provide activities but are not clear about the learning intentions. For example, when young children played in the sand, staff did not extend their learning experiences through good quality interactions or consistent teaching. The provider has failed to address these weaknesses, identified at the previous inspection.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Breaches in safeguarding requirements compromise children's well-being. Staff fail to identify potential hazards to children's safety. They did not promptly clear spills at the water tray to prevent children from slipping over, which put them at risk. Staff encourage children and praise them for their achievements. However, some staff do not use the setting's positive behaviour management strategies consistently or speak to children in an appropriate manner. The key-person system is not effective to help the youngest children settle in. These weaknesses affect children's emotional well-being.

Outcomes for children are inadequate

Children do not have consistency in the key persons that guide their learning. This has a significant impact on their care and prevents them from making adequate progress.

Strong Tower Day Nursery registered in 2013. It is located in the Deptford area of the London Borough of Lewisham. There are 13 members of staff, 12 of whom hold appropriate early years qualifications. The setting operates for most of the year on weekdays between 7am and 7pm.
