Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- Managers have not embedded a rigorous system to monitor staff's practice. As a result, the quality of teaching is too variable. Children do not always engage in purposeful learning to ensure they make consistently good progress.
- Assessment arrangements are not effective. Observations are not evaluative and written records lack evidence of children's progress. Staff do not always identify children's next steps in their learning or effectively plan activities to secure good learning.
- The designated person for safeguarding has not attended appropriate training. There is no named deputy to take charge in the absence of the manager.
- Staff are not always vigilant in maintaining good hygiene practices for children.
- Staff do not consistently promote children's well-being. Risk assessments are not sufficiently robust. Staff do not do all they can to minimise risks and they do not take account of all potential hazards to children.
- Self-evaluation and improvement planning are not good enough. Consequently, leaders have not taken action to address all the issues from the previous inspection and there is no commitment to drive improvement. Self-evaluation does not fully include the views of staff and children.

It has the following strengths

Children whose additional needs are identified are supported well. They make some progress in their communication and language skills.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

The provider does not effectively monitor the quality of the setting. Consequently, there are several breaches of the teaching and learning, and welfare requirements. No action has been taken to address the areas for improvement identified at the previous inspection. Children's play and learning continue to be interrupted by the routines and children are given snacks that are unhealthy, including sweets at the end of a session. The arrangements for safeguarding children are ineffective: a safeguarding concern was not appropriately reported and the nursery does not have a trained designated person for safeguarding. Staff do not always follow the nursery procedures on the safe storage of mobile phones. Staff do not have supervision and appraisals and leaders do not monitor their work or support them well-enough in their roles. There is no effective self-evaluation or action plan in place to drive improvement. As a result, leaders do not have an accurate understanding of the setting's strengths and areas for improvement.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is inadequate

Some staff are unaware of children's current stage of learning; assessments are not accurate. Staff do not consistently conduct observations to identify the next steps in the children's learning and development. Parents have little involvement in their children's learning. They do not consistently contribute to information about children's starting points and are not regularly consulted about how children are developing away from the nursery. The quality of teaching is variable. Some children are not supported as well as others. Some staff pitch activities too low for children's age and abilities and they guickly lose interest as a result. Some of the activities on offer are uninspiring and fail to engage children's interest. This leads to some children spending time wandering around the room without having anything meaningful to do. Consequently, they do not make good progress in their learning. Leaders and staff do not track the progress of individuals or groups of children appropriately. Therefore, gaps in children's learning and development go unnoticed. Too often, the quality of teaching has weaknesses and not all staff have a secure understanding of how to support children's learning and development. They rarely set out clear learning intentions for specific activities. Not all children are well prepared for the next stage in their learning or their transition to school. Staff have made some links with local schools and other professionals such as a speech and language therapist. Children who speak English as an additional language are supported in their early communication skills as they copy actions to their favourite songs. In the baby/toddler room, some group activities support children's emerging language skills. For example, during small-group times some staff use appropriate language to support and engage children.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Children's safety is compromised because staff do not identify and manage all risks. Staff's handbags, which contain personal belongings including mobile telephones, are accessible to children. This is in breach of the nursery policy and could put children at risk of harm. Some risk assessments do not provide sufficient detail to enable staff to manage the risks associated in all areas of the nursery. However, there is a detailed risk assessment for the

outdoor area. Staff are not vigilant in maintaining standards of cleanliness and hygiene. This is particularly evident at lunch time. There is an adequate key person system in place to support children's emotional well-being. Staff and children have warm relationships. Children are mainly well behaved as staff make their expectations clear in a supportive and positive way. Older children play co-operatively with their friends and show they understand the nursery rules. Children benefit from fresh air and exercise in the garden, which enhances their physical development.

Outcomes for children are inadequate

Staff observe children and assess their progress but some staff make inaccurate assessments: they do not assess the child in the correct age band. These inconsistencies limit the identification and planning of next steps to help all children make progress in the area of learning and development in which they need most help.
