## **Summary of key findings for parents**

## This provision is good

- Children are happy, settled and make friends. They learn about acceptable behaviour such as sharing, taking turns, listening to and valuing others. Children gain the skills they need in readiness for starting school.
- Staff make effective use of their observations and assessments to plan for children's individual learning needs. They provide interesting activities, resources and experiences to promote children's ongoing progress.
- Staff effectively model language and focus sharply on helping children to acquire good communication and language skills. Children have many opportunities to make their own choices in play, indoors and outdoors.
- Children have good relationships with their key person and other staff. They enjoy being around adults and regularly seek them out to join in their play.
- The manager is proactive in maintaining good care and education for children. She uses effective self-evaluation methods to identify any areas for further improvement, which motivates staff and helps children to achieve better outcomes.

## It is not yet outstanding because:

- Staff miss opportunities to share information with parents at times, in particular to support children's learning further at home.
- At times, staff do not use all available opportunities to engage younger children fully during group sessions, for example, story time.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

## To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- explore ways of sharing information fully with parents about their children's learning priorities, particularly to extend learning opportunities at home
- make the most of opportunities to engage younger children, particularly during group sessions, to foster their interests fully and sustain their attention.

#### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector observed activities in the main base room and garden.
- The inspector carried out a joint observation with the manager, and checked evidence of suitability and qualifications of staff working with children.
- The inspector sampled relevant documentation, including children's learning records, planning, and a selection of the setting's policies and children's records.
- The inspector held meetings with the provider and spoke with staff at appropriate times throughout the inspection.
- The inspector took account of the views of parents spoken to during the inspection.

# **Inspection findings**

#### Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

Since the last inspection, the manager and staff team have made positive changes to improve the quality of the setting and overall outcomes for children. For example, staff understand the learning and development requirements effectively. The manager monitors staff performance closely and provides ongoing support, such as through regular training, one-to-one meetings and peer observations, to ensure staff continually develop their practice and skills. Safeguarding is effective. Staff have a good understanding of their responsibility to protect children from harm. They implement all policies and safe working practices well to promote children's health, safety and well-being. Staff generally develop good partnerships with parents and other early years settings. Parents comment that staff are caring and friendly, and that their children enjoy attending the nursery.

### Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff have good relationships with children and they are actively involved in their play. The manager and staff monitor the quality of teaching and learning well. They discuss and review the assessments on individual children's progress to ensure they are accurate and to identify any emerging gaps. Staff use good teaching skills to motivate children to learn. For example, children thoroughly enjoy finding out how different colours mix while engaged in messy ice-cube painting. Staff extend younger children's early mathematical skills effectively. For example, they introduce numbers and sizes and children confidently learn to count the bricks while using mathematical language to describe the towers as being 'tall' and 'short'.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children show that they feel safe and grow in confidence. They are keen to explore and are curious about the world around them. Children have good opportunities to play outdoors, where staff deploy themselves well to support children's learning. Children enjoy playing together, such as in the messy kitchen area, preparing imaginary meals together. Staff supervise children well and they complete daily safety checks to ensure children play safely, indoors and outdoors. They help children learn about risks and dangers, such as through everyday activities and discussions. Staff provide a good range of opportunities for children to reflect and value their diverse backgrounds and learn about others.

### Outcomes for children are good

Children achieve well in their learning and development, and make good progress. Children are working at the typical levels for their age and stage of development, and they are gaining the necessary skills for the next stage in their learning.

The Monkey House Nursery School registered in 1997. It is open each weekday during school term time. Sessions run from 9am to 3pm on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, from 8.30am to 3pm on Thursday, and from 12 noon to 3pm on Tuesday. The provider is in receipt of funding for the provision of free early education for children aged two, three and four years. Of the five staff who work with the children, four hold relevant qualifications at level 3 and above. The manager holds a relevant degree and she has achieved Qualified Teacher Status; the deputy is a qualified teacher.

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register.
