Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- The childminder has a weak knowledge of the signs that a child may be at risk of harm. This compromises children's welfare and is also a breach of the Childcare Register.
- The childminder has a poor understanding of safeguarding policy and procedures, including the procedures to follow if an allegation was made against her or a member of her household. In addition, she does not have a written safeguarding procedure, as required for the Childcare Register.
- The childminder has a poor understanding of the safeguarding and welfare requirements. She does not understand all the changes to notify to Ofsted and has a poor knowledge of complaints procedures. These are also breaches of the Childcare Register. Self-evaluation does not identify breaches in the childminder's practice.
- Children do not make sufficient progress. The childminder has a poor understanding of the learning and development requirements and does not observe children's learning effectively. She does not monitor each child's progress to close any gaps in their development or plan age-appropriate activities for their next steps in learning.
- The childminder does not gain information from parents to identify children's starting points and does not involve them in their children's learning in order to support their children's development at home.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

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Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

Safeguarding is ineffective. The childminder does not have, or implement, a suitable safeguarding policy. She has poor knowledge of the signs that may indicate a child is at risk. She does not know the procedures to follow if an allegation is made against her or a member of her household. These weaknesses compromise children's safety and welfare. The childminder does not meet children's individual needs adequately. She does not know, or implement, the Early Years Foundation Stage and has a weak understanding of the requirements. She does not understand all the changes to notify to Ofsted and has a poor knowledge of complaints procedures. The childminder does not evaluate her practice and identify areas for development in order to improve outcomes for children. Despite these weaknesses, the childminder provides a safe environment and helps children learn to keep themselves safe, for example, keeping nearby when out and about.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is inadequate

The childminder has a weak understanding of observation, assessment and planning. She does not monitor children's progress and identify any gaps in their development. The childminder does not identify children's next steps in learning to plan effectively for their individual needs. On occasions, activities are too challenging for children and the childminder uses resources that are not age appropriate. For example, she tries to teach young children the alphabet using an electronic toy. The childminder does not gain information regarding children's interests and early achievements from parents or include them in children's learning and assessments to help support development at home. The childminder promotes children's language and communication skills sufficiently. For example, she encourages children who are learning English as an additional language to use their home language and engage in meaningful conversations.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

The childminder's poor understanding of safeguarding puts children at significant risk, compromising their welfare. Nonetheless, the childminder builds caring relationships with children, which helps them feel happy in her care. She gathers information about children's care routines from parents to help her to meet their personal needs. The childminder provides healthy snacks for children and practises good hygiene. She takes children to local playgroups, the library and to parks. This helps to support their social skills and physical well-being. The childminder helps children learn to behave well and encourages them to play kindly together.

Outcomes for children are inadequate

Children do not gain the skills they need for the next stage in their learning. They do not progress at the expected rate of development typical for their age.
