# Summary of key findings for parents

# This provision is good

- The provider, manager and staff team have a good understanding of their responsibilities, as set out in the Early Years Foundation Stage. The manager regularly evaluates the provision to ensure a sharp focus on any learning gaps or areas for development.
- Children are motivated and engaged in their play and learning. Staff provide a good range of activities and allow children sufficient time to explore and make independent choices in their play.
- Staff make regular observations of children's achievements and use this information to plan activities that link to their next steps in learning. All children make good progress.
- Staff share information with parents regularly, to involve them in their children's learning and enable them to extend children's development at home.
- Staff encourage children to try to do things for themselves. Children are developing the confidence and skills to take responsibility for their own self-care.

### It is not yet outstanding because:

- At times, staff do not provide sufficiently challenging experiences to fully extend the learning of older children.
- The manager does not form the same high-quality partnerships with all other settings that children attend, to enable consistency in their learning.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- strengthen planning to consistently provide sufficient challenge to further extend the learning of older children
- establish strong links with all other settings that children attend, to regularly share key information regarding children's development.

#### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector carried out a joint observation with the manager.
- The inspector observed the relationships between children and staff, and opportunities for children's play and learning.
- The inspector took account of the views of staff, children and their parents.
- The inspector held a meeting with the manager at an appropriate time during the inspection.
- The inspector sampled documentation, including policies and procedures, staff's training records and assessments of children's development.

# **Inspection findings**

#### Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. Since the last inspection, the manager and staff team have worked hard to improve their knowledge of child protection procedures. They have a good understanding of how to refer concerns regarding children's welfare. The manager effectively monitors the progress of individual and groups of children, to quickly identify and address any patterns and gaps. For example, they are currently strengthening the mathematical programme to provide more opportunities for children to count and recognise numerals. Staff receive ongoing support and coaching through regular meetings with the manager, and complete regular training to ensure their continued professional development. For example, a member of staff explained how she now makes better use of storytelling to engage children and extend their learning.

#### Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff provide a broad range of resources to support children's investigation and help them develop preferences. Children particularly enjoy the range of activities offering sensory exploration during 'messy play afternoons'. For example, they excitedly investigate trays of shredded paper and jelly. Staff effectively support children to explore their own ideas, build their confidence to make predictions and motivate them to learn. For instance, when a child suggested that a paper plate could be used to make an umbrella, staff provided a tray of water and paper. Children eagerly place the paper in the water and summarise that wet paper tears easily. Staff frequently ask probing questions to extend children's thinking skills and successfully promote their communication and language.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children are happy and demonstrate that they feel secure and safe in their environment. They settle quickly and develop positive relationships with staff. Children's behaviour is very good. Staff are good role models and consistently ask children to consider their actions. For example, they ask children what might happen if they throw toys. This helps children to understand the potential consequences of their decisions. Children show care for their friends, such as hanging their coats up for them when they struggle to reach the hooks and waving goodbye when children leave. Staff encourage children to take age-appropriate risks as they explore the climbing frame and resources in the garden.

#### **Outcomes for children are good**

All children make good progress from their starting points. Children are confident, communicate effectively and develop a positive attitude towards learning. This helps children to acquire the key skills needed for school.

Silverton Pre School Playgroup opened in the 1960s and the After School Club opened in 2002. They are both managed by a voluntary parents' committee. The groups operate from the Evangelical Church Hall in the Devon village of Silverton, near Exeter. The preschool is open Monday to Thursday from 9.15am to 3.15pm, during term time only. On the same days, the breakfast club is open from 7.30am to 9am and the after-school club is open from 3.15pm to 6pm. Staff collect children from Silverton Primary School. The preschool is in receipt of funding for the provision of free early education for children aged two, three and four years. It employs 12 staff, 10 of whom work with the children. Of these, eight are qualified to level 3 and the manager is qualified to level 6.

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
