The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a good understanding of how to keep children safe. She knows the signs and symptoms that may cause concern regarding a child's well-being and knows the procedures to follow to safeguard their welfare.
- The childminder knows how to identify children's starting points. She understands how to use observation and assessment of their learning in order to plan activities that challenge and help them achieve their next steps in learning.
- The childminder has a good understanding of how to promote and support children's physical well-being. She recognises the importance of teaching children about healthy lifestyles and the benefits of a healthy balanced diet and regular exercise.
- The childminder knows how to support children's emotional development. For example, encouraging children to be independent and learn how to care for their personal needs to help them to be ready for the next stage in the their learning.
- The childminder understands the importance of keeping up to date with training and knowledge of the requirements. She updates her policies and procedures to ensure they reflect current guidance and legislation.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
