## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder has not kept up to date with her first-aid training. She does not have a current first-aid certificate, which means that she is not qualified to deal with an emergency if necessary, when caring for children. This breach also relates to the associated requirements of the Childcare Register.
- The childminder understands the value of working in partnership with others to support children's care and learning. She knows how to manage children's behaviour and the importance of teaching them to respect others.
- The childminder understands the importance of evaluating her provision to improve it.
- The childminder understands the value of teaching children healthy habits, such as eating well-balanced meals and taking daily physical exercise, and of providing activities outdoors.
- The childminder understands how to promote individual children's progress using her knowledge of the areas of learning, assessment methods and of planning activities.
- The childminder is clear about procedures to follow should she be concerned about a child in her care. She knows how to risk assess her premises to keep children safe.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## What the setting needs to do to improve further

**To meet the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and the Childcare Register the provider must:**

The childminder registered in 2000. She lives in Tooting, in the London Borough of Wandsworth. The childminder provides care for children from Monday to Friday from 8am to 6pm, all year round except for four weeks in the summer and on bank holidays. There were no children on roll at the time of the inspection.
