## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands the safeguarding requirements and knows what to do if she has concerns about a child.
- The childminder recognises the importance of teaching children to lead a healthy lifestyle, such as eating well and taking regular exercise.
- The childminder is aware of the different ways that children learn and develop. She knows how to use observations and assessments to plan activities that will help them move on to the next stage of their learning, including school.
- The childminder understands the importance of children being able to make choices about their play. She knows how to promote good behaviour and understands the importance of teaching children to have respect for each other.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working in close partnership with parents and other early years professionals.
- The childminder has met the recommendation set at the last inspection to improve her self-evaluation. She has systems to gather the views of others about her provision.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector looked at all areas of the childminder's home, indoors and outside, that are used by children.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she promotes children's safety and her understanding of safeguarding procedures.
- The inspector looked at a range of documents including the childminder's suitability and qualification records.
- The inspector discussed the childminder's understanding of how children learn and develop and her methods of observing children and assessing their progress.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she works in partnership with parents and other professionals.
