Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is outstanding

- The teaching is outstanding. Staff make exemplary use of extremely detailed assessments to make certain they provide challenge to all children. Children constantly have chances to engage in relevant and meaningful learning opportunities and make exceptional progress.
- Staff are highly skilled and ensure that children develop secure emotional and social skills that prepare them extremely well for school. Children forge highly positive relationships, their behaviour is exemplary and they are consistently motivated to learn.
- The pre-school team is highly committed to improving the setting. It works very closely with parents and children to identify ways to continually improve and sustain the excellent standards of care, teaching and learning. Leadership and management of the setting are exemplary.
- Staff consistently promote children's awareness and sense of safety with meticulous planning and preparation. For instance, children learn how to use real tools competently and safely. Safeguarding is a priority.
- Partnerships with parents and with outside agencies are especially strong. Staff involve parents in every aspect of their children's learning and development. Staff share valuable information to help them build extremely well on what children learn elsewhere.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

■ provide even more opportunities for children to understand that words carry meaning.

- The inspector sampled a wide range of paperwork, including risk assessments, policies and procedures, children's learning journals and the self-evaluation document.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is outstanding

Safeguarding is effective. All staff have a confident and extremely secure understanding of how to protect children from harm. The manager monitors staff training extremely effectively to ensure teaching is of a consistently high quality. She successfully monitors and tracks the progress of individual and groups of children to ensure staff can swiftly close any identified gaps in learning. The highly committed staff team works effectively together and receives excellent support from the manager to improve the quality of their practice. The impact of this professional development shows in the enthusiasm and proactive attitude of the team. Up-to-date and frequent training has an extremely positive impact on outcomes for children. Recent training has enthused staff to develop more effective storytelling skills to enhance children's language development.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is outstanding

Staff provide an extensive range of learning opportunities. They are highly skilled at providing just the right amount of challenge, or standing back to encourage independent learning. For example, children competently and independently set up simple programmes on the computer. Staff provide a vast array of opportunities for children to practise their early writing skills. For example, children keenly combine the use technology by writing and making marks on an interactive white-board. They enthusiastically make lists on clipboards and write with chalk, pens and crayons in all areas of the setting. Opportunities to help children learn that words carry meaning are less extensive, however. Staff are highly responsive to children's changing interests, tailoring activities to meet children's individual needs. They focus sharply on children's communication and language development. For example, they implement recognised national strategies highly successfully to enhance children's vocabulary and speech.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are outstanding

Children develop exceptionally strong attachments with the caring and highly attentive staff. They respect others, work cooperatively, behave extremely well and are very polite. Children flourish in this encouraging and empowering environment. They have extensive opportunities to challenge their physical skills in the exceptionally well-resourced outdoor area.

Outcomes for children are outstanding

Children make significant progress across all areas of their learning. They are active, confident learners who thrive as they learn the key skills they need in readiness for school. They demonstrate high levels of independence and proudly care for their learning environment. For example, they are eager to volunteer and work enthusiastically together to tidy up.
