Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- The supervisor ensures that all staff are aware of their roles and responsibilities. Staff understand how to keep children safe. They are clear about procedures to follow in the event of a safeguarding concern.
- Partnerships with the school and parents are good. Parents comment on the good service offered and that their children enjoy a good range of activities at the club.
- Staff plan a good range of activities that complement children's day at school. Children enjoy taking part in imaginary games, physical challenges and creative activities.
- Children's good health benefits from opportunities to be active outdoors, and from eating a range of snacks that support a healthy lifestyle.
- The supervisor shows a strong commitment to improve the club continually. There are effective systems in place to evaluate the provision and make improvements to benefit children and their families.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- On occasion, the supervisor does not deploy staff effectively to build on and extend children's interests and to help children quickly to manage their behaviour.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- improve staff deployment to consistently build on and extend children's interests, and to deal with their occasional unwanted behaviour quickly.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed activities indoors and outdoors and spoke to children at appropriate times.
- The inspector held meetings with the club supervisor and looked at relevant documentation, such as evidence of self-evaluation and the suitability of staff.
- The inspector conducted observations of the activities and discussed these with the supervisor.
- The inspector spoke to a small selection of parents and took account of their views.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. The supervisor ensures that all staff are aware of the procedures to follow should they have a concern for a child's safety. The provider carries out robust vetting and recruitment procedures to help ensure that staff are suitable to work with children. She ensures that staff make rigorous ongoing risk assessments to keep children safe in the setting. The provider has robust policies and procedures, which she shares with parents and that staff implement to guide their practice. The supervisor reflects on practice and values the input and suggestions from parents and children. She uses this information to make positive changes. For example, she varies the resources and activities based on children's interests. The provider encourages staff to attend training courses and to share their new knowledge at team meetings so that all staff and children benefit.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff collect detailed information from parents when children first start at the club. They use what they learn about each child to plan for their interests. Staff encourage children to share their ideas for activities, and children confidently contribute their thoughts. Children are happy and relaxed, and enjoy their time at the club. They say it is, 'Fun and really good'. Staff plan varied and interesting activities that children enjoy. Children take part in various imaginative games; for example, they pretend to be puppies and extend their play using hoops and balls. Staff encourage children to talk about their experiences; for example, they have lively conversations with staff about eating chips on the beach in Australia.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children arrive happily at the club and settle quickly and comfortably into the routine. Staff welcome children enthusiastically; children all have a key person who knows their needs very well. Staff help children to develop a range of practical skills and encourage them to be independent. Children wash their hands before serving their meals. They choose from a variety of healthy foods, such as fruits and wraps, and tidy away when they have finished. Staff provide plentiful opportunities for children to be outdoors. Children benefit from lots of physical challenge, for example, they play football and confidently ride bicycles. Children talk about the safety of others, explaining not to, 'crash into people, just whizz around.'

Clubland Playscheme Ltd in Dorking registered in 2012. The club opens throughout school term times from the end of the school day to 6pm. The club employs four members of staff who work over different sessions; of these, one holds a childcare qualification at level 4, one holds a childcare qualification at level 3 and one holds a childcare qualification at level 2. The setting is able to provide for disabled children and those who have special educational needs.

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
