Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder demonstrates a clear understanding of safeguarding procedures and how to protect children from harm.
- The childminder understands the importance of helping children to learn how to keep themselves safe.
- The childminder demonstrates a secure understanding of how individual children learn and the characteristics of effective learning. She explains how she will use a range of teaching strategies to help children to progress in all areas of learning.
- The childminder understands how to refine her service, including ideas from parents and children alike. She knows the value of using support networks, such as other childminders and local authority advisors, to improve her knowledge, skills and practice.
- The childminder describes how she will foster children's healthy lifestyles through access to fresh air, healthy eating and promoting good hygiene procedures, in order to promote their physical well-being.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's emotional well-being and explains how she will help them to develop their confidence, motivation to learn and independence.
- The childminder demonstrates a good understanding of how to promote consistent care and learning through building positive partnerships with parents and other professionals.
- The childminder has a positive attitude towards promoting good behaviour for children. She understands the importance of acting as a good role model for children, to help them negotiate and cooperate with others in their play.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector looked at documentation that relates to safeguarding and welfare, such as suitability checks for household members.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver the educational programmes for children and undertake observations, assessment and planning.
- The inspector observed areas to be used for the care of children, along with furniture, equipment and toys that are to be used for childminding.
