## Summary of key findings for parents

#### This provision is inadequate

- Children are not kept safe because staff do not take effective action to minimise all hazards. They do not ensure that doors to the premises are secure and that matches are always out of children's reach.
- Staff supervision does not foster continuous improvement. For example, the provider does not ensure that staff maintain all required records, plan and provide appropriate activities, or follow good food hygiene practice when storing or serving food.
- The quality of teaching is too variable. Some activities are poorly planned so that teaching is ineffective; when this happens, children lose interest and make insufficient progress.
- Managers do not identify whether all groups of children are making good progress. They do not ensure that staff accurately assess children's knowledge and skills in order to plan for their next steps in learning.
- Progress checks for children aged between two and three years do not always identify their strengths and any areas where progress is less than expected. Where issues or concerns are identified, staff do not consider and record how they will be addressed.

## It has the following strengths

- Staff establish strong relationships with children, particularly in the baby room. Children are confident and at ease in the nursery.
- Children learn how to behave because staff have established and apply consistent systems for managing unwanted behaviour.

## What the setting needs to do to improve further

The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action We will issue a Welfare Requirements Notice requiring the provider to:

## **Inspection findings**

#### Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

Leaders and managers do not consistently and effectively promote the safeguarding and welfare, or the learning and development requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage. The provider takes action to address specific issues when they are brought to her attention, but improvements are not always sustained over time. The provider does not monitor the quality of teaching and the progress of different groups of children with sufficient care. Staff supervision does not ensure that teaching is of a consistently high standard across the nursery. As a result, leaders and managers do not identify weaknesses in teaching or inconsistent staff practice which affect the progress some children make. Safeguarding arrangements are not effective. The provider does not ensure that all staff take appropriate action to keep the premises secure. This puts children at risk because unauthorised adults can enter, or children could leave unsupervised. Staff have an adequate understanding of child protection issues. The provider is aware of safe recruitment processes; she ensures that suitability checks are carried out on all staff and maintains appropriate records. There are suitable arrangements for ensuring the required ratios of staff to children are met.

#### Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is inadequate

The quality of observation, assessment and planning is poor. Staff keep written summaries of children's progress, but do not always use them to assess what children need to learn next. Staff do not plan how to adapt activities in the pre-school room to meet the needs of children of different ages and abilities. For example, activities such as story-time in the pre-school room do not meet the needs of the two-year-old children. An adult-led sorting activity to help children recognise and name colours was ineffective. This was because staff had not identified what they intended children to learn and had not selected appropriate resources. As a result, the activity lacked focus, and children quickly lost interest. The required progress checks for two-year-old children do not meet requirements. Staff do not always complete them when children are between the ages of two and three, and they do not always identify the areas where children are progressing well. Where they identify weaknesses, they do not work with parents to identify what extra support may be needed. In the baby room, staff support children's development well. They understand, for example, how to promote children's language, using techniques that are effective for all, including those who speak a home language other than English.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Children enjoy suitable meals, which are prepared on the premises and which meet children's individual dietary needs. However, the provider does not ensure that all staff preparing and handling food consistently follow appropriate hygiene procedures or that correct refrigerator temperatures are maintained. This puts children at risk of cross-infection. Parents say that they are happy with the care provided and feel that their children make good progress. There are sufficient toys and equipment to meet children's needs. Staff identify and address some hazards, for example by ensuring that radiators are covered. However, they do not do enough to minimise risks and significant hazards remain. Staff promote children's welfare adequately by following suitable hygiene

procedures for nappy-changing and sleep routines. They maintain the required records of accidents. Staff follow an established system for managing behaviour, which is shared with parents. As a result, children usually behave well. Staff in the baby room make effective use of children's interests to create satisfying play experiences.

### **Outcomes for children are inadequate**

Two-year-old children do not make as much progress as they could because staff do not accurately identify their needs and adapt activities to meet them. However, older children make better progress. For example, they are eager to practise their writing skills and cooperate well with one another, meaning that they are adequately prepared for school. In the baby room, children develop close, affectionate relationships with staff and begin to become aware of the needs of others.

The Nursery on the Green registered in 1993. It is one of two settings run by a private limited company. It operates from self-contained rooms in Mitcham Methodist Church and also has use of the main hall and an enclosed outdoor area. The nursery opens each weekday between 7.30am and 6pm all year round, apart from bank holidays. It receives funding for the provision of free early education to children aged two, three and four years. It supports children who speak English as an additional language. There are 11 staff who work with the children, eight of whom hold relevant early years qualifications at level 3.

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
