Summary of key findings for parents

The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder does not have a first aid box and suitable contents as required. This is a breach of the Early Years Foundation Stage requirements.
- The childminder does not know how to meet the learning and development requirements to help children make progress. She does not understand how to assess children's learning to identify gaps and plan for further achievements.
- The childminder's evaluation of her practice is not thorough enough to help her identify and address how to make continuous improvements.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working closely with parents to share information about children to meet their individual needs.
- The childminder understands how to safeguard children and how to refer concerns about children's welfare. She knows how to risk assess the environment to make sure it is safe for children to use.
- The childminder is aware of how to promote children's emotional and physical well-being. For example, she knows to provide opportunities for children to exercise, have fresh air and to eat well.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage the provider must:

The childminder registered in 1995. She lives in St. John's Hill, London. She operates between Monday and Friday, from 8am and 6pm, for 50 weeks a year. There were no children on roll at the time of inspection.
