Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- The childminder develops exceptionally good relationships with parents and they speak very highly of her. Routines, such as potty training, and children's next steps in learning are discussed with parents to ensure consistency of care.
- Children settle well and are extremely happy, confident and emotionally secure. Behaviour is very good. Children play exceptionally well together and develop good social skills.
- The childminder praises and rewards children's efforts, which boosts their self-esteem. For example, she gives the children certificates to celebrate what they have done well.
- The childminder makes good use of ongoing training to continually strengthen her skills and knowledge.
- The childminder's home is bright and welcoming. Children are motivated to participate in all activities. The childminder provides a wide range of books and reads to the children, successfully developing their deep love of stories.
- The childminder is skilled at developing children's communication and language development.

It is not yet outstanding because:

■ The childminder makes regular observations of children's learning to determine their interests and abilities. However, assessment is not always quite as refined as possible to help precisely target teaching.

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What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

refine further the assessment of children's progress to provide the clearest picture possible of their achievements and next steps in learning to enable teaching to be targeted as precisely as possible.

- The inspector looked at relevant documentation, including registration and first aid certificates and a sample of policies.
- The inspector looked at the quality of the learning environment.
- The inspector observed the interaction between the childminder and the children.
- The inspector spoke to parents and took account of their views.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The childminder reflects on her practice and accurately identifies areas for improvement. She takes on board suggestions from parents and the children. The childminder has a good knowledge of the curriculum and knows how to promote learning. Safeguarding is effective. The childminder understands her responsibility to protect children and knows what action to take if she is concerned about a child's welfare. She has robust procedures to minimise risks in the home and on outings. For example, she checks the condition of the toys and equipment each day.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The childminder provides a wide range of toys and equipment that engage children and cover all areas of learning. Children enjoy the activities on offer, including outings to local places of interest, such as the zoo and story time sessions at the local library. The childminder undertakes regular observations of children's progress and plans activities based on their current interests. For example, after listening to the story about a caterpillar, children enthusiastically took part in an insect hunt in the garden. Children also find out about the natural world as they play in the communal garden close to the childminder's home. The childminder helps children to develop skills in preparation for school. For example, she promotes mathematics effectively and teaches them to recognise their name.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are outstanding

The childminder skilfully promotes children's independence, including teaching them to manage their own personal hygiene. High-quality toys and equipment are stored at the children's level so that they can take out what they want and help to tidy up afterwards. The childminder provides excellent opportunities for children to learn about other countries and cultures around the world as well as their own. For example, she uses a superb range of toys and books to show children families that are different from theirs and supports them to understand and respect others. The childminder promotes children's self-esteem extremely well. For example, she celebrates their art work through attractive displays in the hallway. Children thoroughly enjoy looking at, and talking about, their pictures, proudly showing their latest work to their parents.

Outcomes for children are good

Children enjoy their time with the childminder and have fun as they play with their friends. They show high levels of imagination and concentration and are highly motivated and eager to learn. All children make good progress, particularly in their communication and language. Children are emotionally secure and well prepared for moving to school.
