Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- Safeguarding is weak. The provider/manager does not check staff's ongoing suitability to work with children, including whether they are disqualified by association. The provider and staff do not have an up-to-date understanding of safeguarding issues. Staff do not take steps to keep babies safe when they sleep. These weaknesses put children at risk and are also breaches of the Childcare Register.
- The provider does not consistently obtain written permission from parents to administer prescribed medication or make a record of medication administered. This is also a breach of the Childcare Register.
- The staff deployed to care for babies lack the skills required to meet their individual care needs. Babies do not always receive the care and attention they need.
- The provider does not ensure that staff and children follow good hygiene procedures.
- Some equipment is not suitable for the youngest children. Chairs are too large and they cannot use them without help from staff.
- Babies are sometimes left without resources to play with. They become restless because they are not engaged in purposeful play. This limits the progress they make.
- Self-evaluation is weak. The provider is not able to identify weaknesses in practice and take effective steps to tackle these.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

The provision is inadequate and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

Safeguarding is ineffective. The owner/provider does not ensure that staff are trained to keep up to date with changes to legislation. For example, they are not aware of all the possible signs that a child is at risk. The provider does not check the ongoing suitability of staff; they are unaware that they must check whether staff are disqualified by association with someone who may not care for children. This puts children at risk. Children's safety is also at risk as staff do not always obtain written parental permission to give prescribed medication to babies or make a record of any medicines administered. The self-evaluation process is poor. The provider does not identify breaches in requirements or weaknesses in staff practice, or take effective action to remedy them.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment requires improvement

Staff promote older children's learning well. For example, they use their knowledge of how children learn to teach them how to draw shapes and write their names in shaving foam. They talk with them about how it feels, to develop their vocabulary. The deputy manager tracks and monitors the children's progress to highlight any gaps in their learning. Staff use this information to plan activities to help children reach the next steps in their learning. Staff keep parents well informed about what their children have been doing. The quality of teaching for babies is less effective. Staff do not always interact enough with them; for example, when babies are in highchairs or in walkers outside.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

The provider does not promote good hygiene procedures. For example, children do not wash their hands before meals, and staff do not consistently wash their hands before preparing babies' bottles and meals. The manager, who is the baby room leader, does not always model good practice to other staff, particularly to trainees. Staff do not meet babies' individual care needs or promote their emotional well-being. During the inspection, babies were given their bottles in highchairs and were also left to sleep in them. Staff do not keep babies safe at all times. For example, they do not always remove bibs or raise the cot side when they put babies down to sleep. This puts babies at direct risk. Resources do not always meet children's needs. For example, the chairs are too big for younger children to use independently and safely.

Outcomes for children require improvement

Older children develop the skills they need for the next steps in their learning. They are inquisitive about the world around them and develop good language and thinking skills. Babies enjoy exploring treasure baskets but they do not always have enough resources or positive staff interaction to help them make good progress, particularly in aspects of their personal and emotional development.

Strawberry Babybubs Nursery registered in 2013. The nursery is situated in Bermondsey, in the London Borough of Southwark.
