Summary of key findings for parents

The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder has failed to attend paediatric first-aid training. This issue has been raised at a number of inspection visits and the childminder has continued to disregard this statutory requirement. This does not promote children's physical well-being or keep children safe.
- The childminder has a secure knowledge of the action to take if concerned a child is being harmed. She attends training to update her knowledge of child protection. Written risk assessments are implemented effectively to help to identify and minimise hazards to children in her home.
- The childminder demonstrates a suitable knowledge and understanding of how to promote the learning and development of children. She describes how she observes children, assesses their progress and how she plans for the next steps in their learning.
- The childminder provides a friendly, home-from-home environment. She has a suitable range of play resources which is presented in a way that encourages children to help themselves and be independent.
- Through discussion, the childminder demonstrates that she knows how to promote continuity in children's care and learning. She has plans to exchange information with parents and other professionals about children's individual care and learning needs.
- The childminder shows a suitable understanding of how to manage children's behaviour. There are plans in place to help children build relationships with each other. Opportunities for children to learn about the wider community and to learn to respect each other are suitable.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

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What the setting needs to do to improve further
