## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder recognises the importance of working in partnership with parents to enable them to be involved in their child's learning and time in her setting.
- There is an appropriate range of toys and equipment to meet the needs of children and suit their individual needs, ages and backgrounds. The childminder recognises how to support children's learning through planning appropriate activities.
- The childminder knows how to monitor children's progress through observation and assessment. She has methods to monitor and evaluate all of her provision.
- The childminder understands her role and responsibility in keeping children safe. She has attended safeguarding training. Her home provides a safe and secure environment.
- The childminder knows how to support children in learning about healthy lifestyles including following good hygiene routines and learning about the importance of exercise to support physical development.
- The childminder knows how to manage children's behaviour, help them learn to share and consider the needs of others. She understands her role in helping children to respect and value others.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector spoke to the childminder about her practices and procedures, and how she intends to deliver the educational programmes for children.
- The inspector viewed the areas of the premises that will be used for childminding and discussed safety arrangements.
- The inspector looked at samples of documentation and records that the childminder will use to support children's welfare and learning when she is childminding.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder her systems for self-evaluation.
