Summary of key findings for parents

The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder does not hold a current paediatric first-aid certificate as required. This is also a breach of the associated requirements of the Childcare Register.
- The childminder is aware of the need to evaluate and improve her practice.
- The childminder understands how to implement safeguarding procedures. She is aware of what would give her concerns for a child's welfare.
- The childminder understands how to help children respect one another and to teach them how to behave well. She knows how to help children gain skills ready for school.
- The childminder knows how to help children to make progress in their learning. She understands how to use observations and assessments, to identify children's achievements and any gaps in learning, to plan for their future development.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's well-being. This includes maintaining their good health and providing them with plenty of fresh air and exercise.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents and other settings children attend, to provide continuity of care and learning for children.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

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What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and the Childcare Register the provider must:
