## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- Following her last inspection, the childminder has addressed the weaknesses raised to meet requirements and improve her practice through self-evaluation.
- The childminder knows how to observe children and identify their next stages of development. She understands the need to plan activities and organise her home to meet children's needs. The childminder understands her responsibility to monitor children's progress and close gaps in their learning, in partnership with parents.
- The childminder understands how to safeguard children. She knows how to carry out risk assessments and take appropriate action to help keep children safe. The childminder is clear of the procedures to follow should a child be at risk of harm. She is aware of the importance of monitoring children's attendance.
- The childminder is aware of how to promote positive behaviour and help children manage their emotions. She knows how to support children to be safe and healthy.
- The childminder understands the importance of working with parents and other early years providers to meet children's individual needs.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
