## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands how children learn and develop. She knows how to observe children and monitor their progress, and how to use this information to plan suitable activities to help them gain the skills needed for their future learning, including the move to school.
- The childminder understands her responsibility to safeguard children. She knows what steps to take if she is concerned about a child's welfare.
- The childminder understands the importance of sharing information with parents about their children's progress to further support their care and education.
- The childminder knows how to promote children's physical and emotional well-being; for example, through regular exercise and providing clear boundaries about acceptable behaviour.
- The childminder understands the value of keeping her skills up to date and the importance of continuing to evaluate her provision.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver the learning and development, and the safeguarding and welfare requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage.
- The inspector spoke to the childminder about her understanding of safeguarding, child protection and first aid.
- The inspector viewed the parts of the childminder's home that she plans to use when caring for children.
- The inspector sampled documentation, including policies and children's records.

The childminder registered in 2006 and lives in Chalfont St Giles, Buckinghamshire. She offers care before and after school, Monday to Friday during term time and occasional care during school holidays. There were no children on roll in the early years age range at the time of the inspection.
