Summary of key findings for parents

The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder does not hold a current paediatric first-aid certificate, which means that he is unable to care appropriately for children should minor accidents occur.
- The childminder has considered how to plan for children's interests and individual needs. He understands the importance of completing observations to assess children's progress and to outline gaps in their development.
- The childminder understands the importance of working closely with parents to support children's specific individual requirements and ensure continuity in their learning and care.
- The childminder shows he is able to successfully identify and minimise risks within his home to help keep children safe from harm. He knows the procedures to follow in the event of child protection concerns and has a policy in place to support to his practice in relation to this.
- The childminder outlines his plans for setting out his provision and resources. He shows a good understanding of the importance of ensuring activities and resources will provide challenge for children and engage their interest.
- The childminder shows he understands the importance of promoting children's healthy lifestyles and their physical development and well-being. He discusses giving children regular opportunities to be outside in the fresh air, playing in the garden and exploring physical challenges on equipment at local parks.
- The childminder demonstrates an understanding of how to promote children's positive behaviour.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

The childminder was registered in 2009 and lives in Leicester. He operates all year round from 8.30am to 9am and 3pm to 3.30pm, Monday to Friday, during school term time and for occasional hours in the school holidays.
