Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Staff thoughtfully plan a wide range of activities that complement the children's school day. Children are busy, involved and engrossed in play from the moment they arrive.
- Children form close relationships with the staff and with one another. Staff place a strong emphasis on developing children's personal, social and emotional skills. They give lots of praise to children during activities, supporting their good self-esteem.
- Staff support children's health and well-being very effectively. Children follow good hygiene routines and understand why these are important as part of living a healthy lifestyle. Staff teach children how to play safely, and to manage risk for themselves.
- The manager involves staff well to reflect on their practice and evaluate the provision. This helps her ensure that they continually provide good quality care and improve the service they provide for children and families.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- Staff sometimes miss opportunities to give all children further responsibilities to develop their independence even further.
- There are not enough opportunities for children to find out about other cultures and the wider world.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- extend opportunities for children to do things for themselves and develop their independence even further
- help children to learn more about other cultures and the wider world.

- The inspector observed staff and children in their indoor and outdoor activities.
- The inspector undertook a joint observation with the manager.
- The inspector held discussions with the manager, staff, children and parents.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The manager and staff have a firm understanding of their responsibility to keep children safe from harm. They know what action they must take if they have any concerns about children's welfare. Safeguarding is effective. The manager follows rigorous systems for staff recruitment and vetting. Staff receive good support in their professional development and work as an effective team. The manager holds meetings and encourages staff to keep their knowledge and skills up to date through research, training opportunities and regular discussions. Partnerships with parents are strong. The manager and staff work well with them to support children's social skills and enjoyment. They keep parents well informed about the activities offered. There are good links with the school. Staff share all relevant information to support children's care and welfare successfully.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Children are settled, happy, enjoy the activities on offer and have fun at the club. Staff provide a range of activities which enables children to choose whether they want to relax or be physically active. Staff support children's communication and language skills well. For example, they talk to them about their day and ask questions that make children think and work things out for themselves during activities. Since the last inspection, staff have improved children's creative opportunities well. Children enjoy using their imaginations and a range of interesting materials to make things, such as using glue and crayons to make models of fish. Staff provide good opportunities for children to write for different purposes. For example, they use a board and chalks to play games, and write their names on their finished artwork. Staff interact positively with children, joining in with their games and supporting children to gain a variety of skills, such as coordination and physical agility. Children become confident and develop good skills for future learning.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

The caring and attentive staff are good role models. They treat children with respect, listening carefully to what they have to say and respecting their views. Children's behaviour is very good and older children show care and consideration for the younger ones. Staff provide a welcoming and inviting environment. They get to know the children well, and help them to feel valued and develop a sense of belonging, for example, as they greet them warmly when they arrive. Children enjoy sitting together to eat nutritious snacks, developing their good understanding of healthy eating and improving their social skills. There are plenty of opportunities for children to enjoy exercise outdoors to support their physical development and good health.
