# Summary of key findings for parents

#### This provision requires improvement. It is not yet good because:

- The childminder does not always fully assess risks to children and this breach of requirements also relates to the Childcare Register. For example, she has not implemented secure procedures for the use of the trampoline. However, these breaches in requirements do not have a significant impact on children's safety and well-being.
- The childminder does not keep accurate records of accidents and incidents that occur while the children are in her care and the first aid given.
- The childminder does not always fully support children's understanding of safety, to help them learn more about keeping themselves safe in different situations.
- The childminder does not always offer children opportunities to practise their early writing skills and see a range of print, to fully develop their early reading and writing abilities.

#### It has the following strengths

- The childminder is aware of the action to take and who to contact should she have any concerns in relation to safeguarding children.
- The childminder has a strong knowledge and understanding of the ways in which children develop. She develops her knowledge and skills to provide activities that engage and motivate them to learn well overall. Outcomes for children are good.
- Children settle well. They are happy and enjoy their time in the childminder's home.

- The inspector read letters of reference from parents to take account of their views.
- The inspector and the childminder evaluated the effectiveness of an activity together.

# **Inspection findings**

#### Effectiveness of the leadership and management requires improvement

Safeguarding is effective. The childminder is aware of any signs that may cause concerns about a child's welfare. She has not covered all resources children use, to assess their safety effectively. However, she has completed some risk assessments for her home to help keep children safe. The childminder does not keep records of accidents, as required. She does inform parents of any accidents involving children, so promotes the children's well-being in this respect. She updates parents about activities their children have engaged in, to keep them informed of their progress. The childminder shows a commitment towards improving her practice. She has met the action set at the last inspection and includes the views of parents, children and others to develop her service. The childminder has strong links with the other settings that children attend to ensure children have continuity of care and learning.

#### Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The childminder monitors children's progress and uses the information gathered to plan for their next steps in learning, based on their interests. She provides children with a good variety of interesting and stimulating play experiences. For instance, as children explore a light box, she talks about colour and shape to extend their mathematical development. The childminder makes good use of commentary and repetition to support the children's speech. She supports their personal, social and emotional development well. For example, children take part in regular visits to groups to meet with their friends and to learn about the world around them.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare require improvement

The childminder is a good role model and sets clear rules and boundaries to help children to learn how to share and take turns. For example, children take turns using the marble-run game. Children's behaviour is good and appropriate for their ages. The childminder has appropriate fire detection resources and evacuation procedures in place, to help keep children safe in an emergency. Children have daily opportunities to explore and investigate in the garden and local parks to practise their physical skills. The childminder provides a range of healthy snacks and nutritious home-made meals that children enjoy, to help them learn about following healthy diets.

#### Outcomes for children are good

Children make good progress in their learning and development. They are independent and eagerly help to carry out small tasks, such as tidying away their toys before mealtimes. Children are confident and enjoy showing how they can put on their own coats and wellington boots for outside play. They have the skills needed for their future learning and in readiness for their eventual move to school.
