Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Staff establish caring and friendly relationships with children. They provide a good range of resources, play alongside the children and motivate them in their play.
- The behaviour of children is good. Staff provide consistent, clear boundaries and teach children about the behavioural expectations. They give children praise and encouragement and celebrate their achievements.
- Children's health benefits from opportunities to be active outdoors and from eating a range of healthy snacks as part of a healthy lifestyle.
- The staff team plans a good range of challenging activities which is based on children's interests. As a result, children have fun and thoroughly enjoy their time at the club.
- Management uses self-evaluation effectively to identify achievements and areas for further development. They seek feedback from parents and children, for example, through discussions and surveys to contribute towards improving their practice and providing a good service.

It is not yet outstanding because:

Staff do not regularly seek additional information about what children know and can do from the host school, to make sure they can complement what children are learning there.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

obtain more information from the school that enables staff to complement the learning that takes place there.

- The inspector observed the quality of activities indoors and outdoors.
- The inspector held a meeting with the club manager. She looked at relevant documentation, such as the club's self-evaluation and evidence of the suitability of staff working in the club.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. Staff have a thorough understanding of child protection procedures and know how to safeguard children's well-being. Potential risks are minimised as staff carry out regular checks of the premises. Staff practice is underpinned by robust policies and procedures. Good levels of support from the manager builds staff's confidence and raises their enthusiasm and personal effectiveness. Staff appraisals are used to promote their professional development. The manager supports staff to gain relevant level 3 qualifications. The management team constantly seeks, evaluates and acts on the views of parents, staff and children to drive continuous improvement. Parents speak highly of the care their children receive and of how staff communicate with them. Action plans to improve all areas of the club are ongoing and effective overall.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Children benefit from activities that support their interests and develop their skills. They spend time outdoors each day, enjoying fresh air and vigorous exercise. Staff help extend their physical skills, for example, as they kick balls, learn to skip and use the outside equipment. Children use the parachute together to make different patterns and create different games. Indoors, children enjoy playing with a good selection of high-quality toys and resources. They join together to play table football, draw pictures and explore the play dough. Children engage in table-top games and use small-world resources. Staff encourage children to work together, play cooperatively and use their imaginations. They show a strong interest in what children do and say. Their effective interactions encourage children to talk about their experiences, to listen to others and respond to questions. This helps develop children's self-esteem and confidence. Staff are well qualified and use their knowledge effectively to help guide and support children.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

The areas where children play are well organised. This helps children to move around freely and safely and make choices in their play. Daily routines are well embedded and children follow good hygiene routines and manage their personal care needs well. Children are confident and behave well. They take turns and share resources. Staff encourage children to be respectful of others and to recognise their own unique qualities. An effective key-person system ensures all children feel secure and settled. Staff know the children well and are attentive to their needs. Children readily go to staff for help and support. Children develop good social skills, which helps prepare them well for the future.
