Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a good understanding of the learning and development requirements. She recognises that children are unique and have different learning preferences. She is aware that activities can be adapted to meet children's individual learning needs, and that good quality teaching will help children acquire the skills they need for future learning.
- The childminder has a secure understanding or the safeguarding and welfare requirements and is aware to notify Ofsted of any significant events or any changes to her circumstances.
- The childminder demonstrates a good understanding of carrying out observations and assessments of children's learning and development. She has procedures in place to monitor the progress that children make in all areas of their learning, and how she can support their learning if gaps begin to emerge.
- The childminder has a system in place to ascertain children's starting points and to use these to plan for future learning. She also has a system in place to complete the progress check for children aged two years. She is aware of the requirement to share the progress check with parents and if needed, outside agencies to support integrated working.
- The childminder has undertaken training on child protection procedures. As a result, she knows the correct procedures to follow if she has a concern about a child's safety and well-being. The childminder also demonstrates a good understanding of action to take if an allegation is made against herself or a family member.
- The childminder demonstrates a good understanding of how to promote children's good health and emotional well-being. She understands how to manage children's behaviour and how to ensure that all children feel included and valued.
- The childminder is realistic in her self-evaluation and she demonstrates a commitment to further improve the quality of practice. She has systems in place to work with parents and carers to ensure the best outcomes for children.

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There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
