Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has worked hard to address the actions raised at the last inspection. She understands about ensuring ratios are appropriately met at all times. She has also developed her knowledge and understanding of using assessments to plan challenging experiences for children.
- The childminder demonstrates her knowledge in supporting children's growing confidence and independence. She discusses how this will help children to become ready for their move to the next setting, including school.
- The childminder has a sound knowledge and understanding of child protection procedures. She demonstrates a clear understanding of her responsibility to make sure children are protected from possible abuse and neglect.
- The childminder discusses how she will use the broad range of toys, resources and equipment to extend children's development across a range of areas of learning. She discusses how she will take children on outings to places of interest.
- The childminder understands the importance of developing close partnerships with parents and other providers to ensure children's needs are met.
- The childminder demonstrates her clear awareness of how she will promote children's healthy lifestyles. She will provide daily opportunities for children to be physically active outdoors, so that their physical development is promoted. The childminder will make sure children are provided with a healthy balanced range of snacks and meals each day.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
