The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands her role to safeguard children. She is aware of the procedures to follow if she had a concern about the welfare of a child in her care. She takes suitable steps to reduce potential hazards in her home.
- The childminder understands how to support children's learning and their good progress by providing a challenging learning environment and activities. She knows to use observations and assessment to help her identify children's achievements and plan for their future development.
- The childminder keeps up to date with mandatory training and childcare issues. She reads relevant literature and has plans to attend various workshops before she resumes childminding.
- The childminder understands how to work with parents and other professionals to provide a consistent approach to meeting children's care and learning needs.
- The childminder is aware of the importance of supporting healthy lifestyles for children. For example, she talks about providing regular opportunities for them to play outside and enjoy a healthy, balanced diet.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
