Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- Children's hours of attendance are not accurately recorded throughout the nursery.
- Staff do not provide children aged between one and two years with appropriate equipment to promote effective sleep routines or to limit the spread of infection.
- Staff working with the youngest children are not proactive in assessing choking risks during malleable activities they are undertaking.
- On occasions, staff do not follow the nursery policy for administering prescribed medicines to children.
- Staff deployment is not fully effective; specifically when staff working with younger children leave the room to complete daily routines. In addition, during the lunchtime period there are fewer staff available to engage with children and swiftly respond to their needs.
- Older and more-able children are not always provided with learning opportunities that fully challenge their thinking and maximise their learning in the outdoor area.

It has the following strengths

- Staff take time to get to know children and their families and have developed extremely strong and trusting relationships, helping all children to thrive.
- Children behave well because staff implement consistent boundaries and routines.
- Partnerships with parents, local schools and outside agencies are secure.
- The well-qualified managers and team have clear aspirations to improve. Selfevaluation provides an overview of the improvements they wish to make. In addition, they have regular supervision sessions which lead to targeted additional training to help make improvements in practice.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective. The managers do not ensure that staff adhere to the policies and procedures that are in place. For example, daily registers are not consistently completed, which compromises children's safety and well-being. The managers are aware of this but have failed to take swift and appropriate action to rectify the breach in legal requirements. Furthermore, staff working with younger children do not stringently follow the nursery's policy for administering medicines, therefore, a written record of what has been administered is not maintained and medicines are not stored in line with the nursery's policy. Additionally, risk assessments are not completed when new toys are introduced to the nursery and this puts children at risk. Despite this, staff have an understanding of child protection issues because they have developed their knowledge by attending training. This helps staff to understand what to do when concerns are raised about a child in the nursery.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment requires improvement

Staff have a generally satisfactory understanding of each child's individual needs and learning styles, which supports children to make progress in their learning. Systems for observation, planning and assessment are in place. Parents are suitably involved in their children's learning. Staff talk to parents each day and discuss individual children's achievements. Staff question children during child-led activities, which encourages children to work problems out for themselves as they play. However, when older children access the outdoor area staff take on a supervisory role and miss opportunities to challenge their thinking and maximise their learning. Children adequately learn the basics and older children are beginning to learn more about letters, numbers and colours.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Arrangements that support children's good health and well-being are not effective. Suitable furniture is not available for children between one and two years at sleep times and the risk of the spread of infection is not minimised. For example, a number of children sleep directly on cushions that are used throughout the day in the cosy corner. These are shared between children and are not routinely cleaned or washed after use. This means children are at risk of cross-contamination and infection. Children enjoy a varied and nutritious hot lunchtime meal and healthy snacks. However, deployment of staff at this time is weak. For example, children aged two to three years all eat together with only two members of staff, to accommodate staff breaks rather than the needs of children. This means opportunities to support independence and interact with children are missed. Comprehensive risk assessments are in place for indoors and the garden. However, staff do not always make stringent routine safety checks to ensure that the resources they introduce are suitable for children. For example, staff working with the children aged between one and two years have not considered the hazards related to choking or the suitability of the ingredients when providing some malleable experiences, such as small water beads.

Outcomes for children require improvement

Children make sufficient progress and most are working within the development band appropriate for their age. The manager and staff regularly review children's individual progress and check the accuracy of their ongoing assessments. This helps to quickly identify any gaps in learning. Children are learning to socialise and to develop the skills needed for the eventual move to school.

Jolly Giraffes Day Nursery was registered in 2004. The nursery employs 22 members of childcare staff. Of these, 14 hold appropriate early years qualifications at level 3, four hold foundation degrees, the two owners hold Qualified Teacher Status and the curriculum coordinator holds Early Years Professional status. The nursery opens Monday to Friday, all year round, except for one week at Christmas and on bank holidays. Sessions are from 7.30am until 6pm. The nursery provides funded early education for three- and four-year-old children.

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
