Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder has met the actions and recommendations set at her last inspection. All adults in the home have now undertaken appropriate suitability checks and the childminder is able to confidently discuss her understanding of the learning and development requirements.
- The childminder understands her local safeguarding procedures and knows how to report concerns to the appropriate authorities. She understands her responsibility to protect children's welfare.
- The childminder talks confidently about how she intends to assess and monitor children's progress, to ensure that they learn and develop appropriately. She understands the requirement to undertake a progress check for children aged between two and three years.
- The childminder's home is safe and welcoming. A suitable range of toys and resources, such as puzzles and books, is available to promote young children's learning.
- Systems are in place for working in partnership with parents to meet children's needs. The childminder understands the value of gathering initial details about children's starting points and sharing information about care and learning needs, for example, through using a daily diary.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's well-being and good health. She confidently discusses how she would promote hygiene procedures. She understands the benefit of regular exercise and spending time in the fresh air.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver the educational programmes for children and how she plans to undertake observation, assessment and planning.
- The inspector looked at policies and documents the childminder intends to use when caring for children.
- The inspector viewed areas that are used when caring for children, inside and outdoors.
- The inspector checked evidence of the suitability of the childminder and household members.
