Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Children form good, close relationships with the childminder and each other. They are happy, behave well, and learn to respect and consider the views and feelings of others.
- The childminder has high expectations for all children, based on her observations and assessments of their current skills and knowledge. Teaching is consistently good and effective.
- The childminder plans and organises a wide range of interesting activities. All children make good progress in their learning.
- The childminder supports children's communication and language skills well. For example, she adds new words into their vocabulary and asks questions to extend their learning.
- The childminder has a good understanding of her responsibilities, and has a range of clear procedures and policies that she uses to underpin her practice and support children's health, safety and well-being effectively.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- The childminder's self-evaluations of her practice are not extensive enough, particularly to reflect the views of all service users, such as parents and children, to help target further improvements.
- The childminder does not share information fully at times with staff from other settings that children attend, to aid greater consistency in their learning and development.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- make better use of ongoing self-evaluation to reflect the views of children and parents fully, to help raise the quality of the provision to a higher standard
- strengthen partnerships with other settings that children attend, to provide even greater consistency in supporting children's learning and development.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the childminder's teaching and its impact on the children's learning.
- The inspector checked documents, including the childminder's background and suitability checks, and training certificates.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder about children's individual learning and development.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder about her self-evaluation processes.
- The inspector looked at a range of the childminder's policies and procedures, including those relating to safeguarding.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The childminder regularly keeps her professional knowledge up to date to improve her teaching practice and achieve better outcomes for children. She completes regular child protection training to help her understand the procedures to follow should there be any concerns about a child's well-being. Safeguarding is effective. The childminder keeps parents regularly informed of their children's next steps in learning. In general, parents praise the childminder for helping them to complement their children's learning further at home. The childminder carries out detailed risk assessments to reduce any hazards. She keeps a detailed record of any accidents and incidents, and effectively shares this with parents.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The childminder plans learning opportunities carefully to extend children's individual needs, such as their social skills, literacy and mathematical development. For example, children talk about measuring and quantities while baking cakes or playing in the sand tray. The childminder has a working allotment that the children often visit, where they frequently bring back produce to eat. For example, they cook a courgette cake with produce they have grown from the allotment, and eat strawberries and blackberries at snack time, which they have picked. The childminder frequently engages children in their favourite stories and songs. They join in enthusiastically, learn new words and repeat sounds. The childminder teaches children effectively about other people and communities beyond their immediate experiences.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

The childminder provides a welcoming and well-resourced environment. Children are motivated and interested in a wide range of stimulating activities. Children learn the importance of washing their hands and receive positive praise from the childminder. Older children learn to carry out tasks independently. Children are well behaved and they share well. The childminder uses good strategies to support children's understanding of acceptable ways to behave. For example, children react with obvious glee when they receive reward stickers for their tidying-up skills. Children have a wide variety of healthy meals; the childminder gives clear messages to children about eating healthily. For example, she reminds them to eat their salad to 'help them to grow big and tall'.

Outcomes for children are good

Children gain good early literacy and mathematical skills, in readiness for their future learning, such as starting school. They are confident, freely explore the environment inside and outside, and choose resources to support their interests. Children are very happy; they regularly laugh together while playing in the lively atmosphere.
