## Summary of key findings for parents

## This provision is good

- Children are happy, confident and settled at the nursery. They develop warm and close relationships with staff, feel emotionally secure and safe.
- There are effective partnerships with parents, carers and external agencies involved in children's care and learning. Parents receive useful information about the provision and are kept well informed about their children's achievements. This makes a significant contribution to meeting children's needs.
- Staff plan and provide a wide range of activities and learning experiences which children enjoy. All children make good progress.
- Management shows a strong commitment to providing good quality care and education. Self-evaluation is effective and leads to a clear action plan for ongoing improvements. This helps to ensure positive outcomes for children.
- Staff are good role models. Under their guidance, children listen and follow instructions. Children are polite and kind, developing positive friendships with one another.

## It is not yet outstanding because:

- Staff do not always encourage parents to provide information about what their children already know and can do on entry, to fully support planning from the outset.
- Occasionally, staff do not recognise opportunities to use their good knowledge of the children to fully extend their learning.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- gain further information from parents about what their children already know and can do on entry to fully support planning for individual needs from the start
- make the most of all opportunities to fully extend children's learning.

## **Inspection activities**

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching and the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector carried out a joint observation with the deputy manager.
- The inspector held a meeting with management and spoke to staff, children and parents.
- The inspector sampled a range of documentation, including children's learning records and safeguarding procedures.

## **Inspection findings**

## Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. Staff have a good understanding of the procedures to follow should they have a concern about a child's welfare. Management follows thorough recruitment procedures, and ongoing discussions help to ensure the continued suitability of staff. This helps to support children's safety. Staff develop their knowledge and understanding through training opportunities. For example, following training, staff improved the organisation of the baby room and developed a good range of exciting and challenging outside play activities.

### Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Children enjoy a wide range of learning activities and take part enthusiastically. For example, younger children thoroughly enjoy using their senses to explore paint, using their hands and small wheeled vehicles to make patterns and shapes. Babies excitedly sing action songs, dance and move their bodies in time to the rhythm. Staff know the children and families well. They regularly observe and assess children's development, and plan for any gaps in learning effectively so that children quickly catch up with their friends. Staff interact thoughtfully with children and ask questions which help them to think about what they are doing and how to solve problems. For example, what might happen to a flower when colouring is added to the water?

### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children enjoy the company of the staff. Staff are animated in their responses to children and give them lots of praise and encouragement, which successfully boosts children's confidence and self-esteem. Children have good opportunities for outdoor activities and they have fun being physically active. For example they learn to balance and climb on the equipment. They hunt for bugs and enjoy pretend play in the mud kitchen. Children's health and hygiene awareness is good. For example, they enjoy freshly cooked nutritious meals and follow thorough handwashing routines, understanding why these are important.

#### Outcomes for children are good

All children, including those who need extra help, make good progress in all areas of learning. They develop the skills they need for the next stage of their learning and school. For example, children are developing early reading and writing skills as they learn about letter sounds, enjoy stories and books. They count in routines and activities, match numerals correctly and make simple calculations. Children develop good independent skills. For example, they pour their own drinks, serve themselves lunch and help to tidy away afterwards.

Combe Down Nursery registered in 2008. It is situated in the village of Combe Down, in Bath. The nursery is open Monday to Friday from 8am to 6pm for 51 weeks of the year.
