Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- The childminder provides a warm, welcoming and stimulating environment where children have access to a good range of easily accessible resources. They make independent choices as they play.
- The childminder has a good understanding of the learning and development requirements and how to monitor, track and plan to help all children make good progress.
- Children behave well. They are given clear guidance about the childminder's expectations for behaviour. She is a positive role model. She teaches children to share, take turns, be tolerant of others and have good manners.
- The childminder promotes children's physical skills according to their ages and stages of development. She does this through a wide variety of interesting and challenging experiences, including outings in the local community.
- The childminder takes time to get to know the children so they feel safe and emotionally secure in a welcoming environment. Children form close attachments with the caring childminder and build strong friendships with other children.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- On occasions, the childminder misses opportunities during children's play to extend and build on their mathematical learning.
- Self-evaluation does not have the exceptional detail that helps identify ongoing priorities and plans that will help the provision to reach outstanding levels.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- make better use of everyday opportunities to further extend children's understanding and enjoyment of early mathematics
- enhance the way in which self-evaluation is used to help shape ongoing plans to raise the quality of the provision to an outstanding level.

Inspection activities

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector completed a joint observation with the childminder.
- The inspector held a meeting with the childminder. She looked at relevant documentation, such as the self-evaluation and evidence of the suitability of adults within the home.
- The inspector took account of parents' written comments.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. The childminder is fully aware of the procedures to follow if she has concerns about a child in her care. She carries out thorough risk assessments to keep children safe in all areas of her home and on outings. The childminder monitors children's progress through tracking their ongoing development. She is effective in seeking early intervention for children when necessary. The childminder accesses training and analyses the impact of this on her practice. She develops strong partnerships with parents, professionals and schools to promote a consistent approach to children's care, learning and development. Children's achievements are celebrated with parents, who feel very well informed and involved in their children's learning.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The enthusiastic childminder provides children with exciting activities and experiences that engage them and motivate them to learn. Learning is fun and children are excited to join in with activities led by the childminder and those they choose for themselves. They show sustained concentration as they model with dough, investigating how they roll the dough and cut out various animals with cutters. Children initiate imaginative play as they make cups of tea and feed the dolls. The childminder places a strong emphasis on communication and language and understanding the natural world during teaching and learning opportunities. For example, she sings songs with children and is skilled at asking questions and encouraging their responses. There are opportunities to practise early writing and reading skills, such as through exploring a range of books to encourage children's interest in written words.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children benefit from their close and supportive relationships with the childminder. She tailors her routines to reflect the preferences and needs of children. For example, she organises snack and meals to accommodate individual children's choices. Children play together well and show they care about each other. The childminder supports healthy eating effectively. She encourages children to try a broad range of nutritious foods to widen their diet and support their healthy growth. The childminder offers a wide range of opportunities to help children learn about the world around them. This encourages them to respect and value each other's differences.

Outcomes for children are good

All children learn to be independent, develop good social skills and enjoy learning through play. They learn to share, wait to take their turn and use good manners. They are confident and active and show the characteristics of effective learning. All children make good progress and are developing the necessary skills to support their future learning, for example, in school.
