## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands how to observe and assess children's development. She knows how to plan experiences to help them make progress and gain skills in preparation for school.
- The childminder recognises the importance of sharing information with parents and other settings that children attend to help support their learning and well-being.
- The childminder understands how to use the views of parents and children to help her evaluate her practice and plan for continuous improvement.
- The childminder knows how to promote healthy lifestyles. She recognises that children benefit from daily fresh air and physical activities. She knows how to promote children's emotional well-being and develop their independence and self-confidence.
- The childminder has a good understanding of child protection procedures and her responsibility to safeguard children's welfare. The childminder implements necessary systems relating to children's health and safety. For example, she completes risk assessments, attendance, and accident and medication records. She maintains a valid paediatric first-aid certificate.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector viewed all areas of the home used by the children.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she supports children's learning and development.
- The inspector looked at documentation, including policies, procedures, attendance records, self-evaluation and the first-aid certificate.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she meets the safeguarding and welfare requirements.
