## Summary of key findings for parents

#### This provision is good

- The childminder has a secure understanding of the early years foundation stage. She makes learning fun and considers children's differing interests and needs carefully. Children make good developmental progress from their starting points.
- Children develop their communication and language skills well. For example, the childminder uses effective strategies such as speaking clearly and modelling very good use of language during play.
- Children are settled. They have built a secure and trusting relationship with the childminder, who is kind and gentle to them. This supports their emotional well-being.
- Partnerships with other professionals are successful. For example, the childminder makes a good effort to share information with teachers from other settings children attend. Children benefit from the consistent approach in their education and care.
- The childminder supervises children carefully, while providing them the time and freedom to thrive in their tasks. She risk assesses the environments effectively to help keep children safe.

#### It is not yet outstanding because:

- Children do not have consistent opportunities to enrich their early writing and literacy skills.
- Sometimes, the childminder misses opportunities to enable children to make decisions and express their ideas, thoughts and imaginations, to fully extend their learning.

# What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- develop more opportunities for children to practise their early writing and literacy skills
- improve opportunities for children to think for themselves and develop their decisionmaking skills.

#### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector observed activities and interactions between the childminder and children, and spoke with the childminder and children at appropriate times.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder in relation to observations of the children's play, learning and progress.
- The inspector examined the childminder's policies and procedures including safeguarding and her first-aid certificate.
- The inspector discussed the childminder's self-evaluation process and how she evaluates the setting to target areas for improvement.
- The inspector read written questionnaires from parents.

# **Inspection findings**

#### Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

Safeguarding is effective. The childminder undertakes regular training, for example she has completed an advanced safeguarding course to increase her awareness of current child protection procedures. She is confident about making referrals if she has any concerns about a child in her care. The childminder thoroughly enjoys her work and shows a strong commitment to improving her knowledge and skills. She makes effective use of the self-evaluation process to evaluate what she does and to improve outcomes for children. For example, following the last inspection, she reflected on her outdoor provision, including the use of resources, to support children's all-round learning and development further.

### Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The childminder makes effective use of the information gained from her precise observations and assessments of children's progress. For example, she engaged children in a messy activity of how to make firework pictures with citrus fruits, as part of the next steps in their learning. Children responded positively as the childminder talked to them about the different sounds that fireworks make and of how to keep themselves safe. The childminder is skilful at building on what children like and enjoy doing. For example, when the childminder noticed that children showed an interest in superheroes, she talked to them about spiders and the webs that spiders make, and engaged them in purposeful conversations to keep them highly motivated.

#### Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children's healthy lifestyles are supported well. They enjoy being physically active in the garden. For example, children learn how to throw and catch a ball, developing their coordination skills. The childminder supports children's social skills and understanding of the world well, for example, as she takes them to different groups to play with others. The childminder works closely with parents to support children's good behaviour such as discussing her rules and boundaries with them. She role models kindness and respect to help children understand what is expected of them. This builds children's self-esteem and confidence.

#### **Outcomes for children are good**

Overall, children gain the skills they need for their future learning. For example, older children develop their mathematical and creative skills to complement their learning elsewhere. Younger children learn to do things for themselves, to support their independence skills. Children are happy and play well together. During outdoor play, for example, children had a wonderful time as they took turns crawling through the toy tunnel and celebrated each other's achievements.
