## Summary of key findings for parents

## This provision is inadequate

- None of the staff, including the manager, hold a current first-aid certificate. This has a significant impact on securing the children's safety and well-being.
- The manager does not monitor the provision effectively to help ensure all the safeguarding and legal requirements are met. This relates to making sure all mandatory training is up to date to ensure children are fully safeguarded.
- The manager has not focused sharply on identifying how she can help all staff raise the quality of their teaching to an even higher level.
- The information gained from children's developmental assessments is not used meticulously to support every child to undertake highly challenging activities.

## It has the following strengths

- The quality of teaching is consistently good and on occasions outstanding. Staff provide a rich range of experiences with a clear learning focus to help children make good progress.
- Staff form strong partnerships with parents. They keep parents well informed about their children's progress and achievements and how they can continue their children's learning at home.

## What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage the provider must:

- make even better use of the information gained from children's developmental assessments to help plan precisely for every child to make the best possible progress.

- The inspector completed a joint observation and held a meeting with the manager.
- The inspector looked at relevant documentation, such as the pre-school's action plan and evidence of the suitability of staff working in the pre-school.

## **Inspection findings**

## Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

Arrangements for safeguarding are not effective. Meeting the safeguarding and welfare requirements and securing the children's well-being is not given adequate priority. Children's welfare is significantly compromised because the manager does not ensure at least one person who has a current paediatric first-aid certificate is on the premises and available at all times when children are present and to accompany children on outings. Although all staff have undertaken paediatric first-aid training previously, their certificates have expired and they are not booked on to any training to renew them. As a result, staff do not have an up-to-date knowledge of administering first aid in an emergency situation. That said, the manager places a better focus on ensuring staff are suitably trained in child protection issues. For example, staff have a good understanding and know the procedure to follow if they are concerned about a child being abused.

## Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Staff are well qualified and knowledgeable about the children's individual educational needs. The routine is organised well with a clear focus placed on teaching children. For example, snack time is used exceptionally well, not only to promote their self-help skills but also to reinforce children's literacy and mathematical learning. Staff use interesting topics and resources and incorporate children's interests well. This helps staff quickly capture the children's curiosity and children show sustained levels of interest during activities. Staff place a strong focus on supporting children who speak English as an additional and those who have difficulty communicating. They encourage them to use sign language to help them communicate.

## Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

The weakness in leadership and management means children's welfare is not assured. Nevertheless, staff are caring and have close relationships with children. They create a calm environment and children are given the time and space they need to learn and explore. Staff teach children well about healthy lifestyles and how to keep safe through topics, play and discussions. Staff provide good opportunities for children to learn about the needs of others and differences between themselves and others within the group.

## **Outcomes for children are good**

All children, including two-year-old children receiving additional funding, make good progress from their starting points. Children thoroughly enjoy the phonics session and enjoy linking letters and sounds. They show a good interest in number, colour, shape and problem solving. Children learn that print carries meaning as they distinguish whose names are on the monitor board to help at snack time. Children look forward to taking on extra responsibility, are well behaved and show care and concern for others. Children develop the key skills required in preparation for school.

Little Einsteins Pre-School/Nursery was registered in 2010. The pre-school opens term time only. Sessions are from 9am until midday and 1pm until 4pm with a lunch club from midday until 1pm. The pre-school provides funded early education for two-, three- and four-year-old children. The pre-school employs four members of staff, including the manager, of whom all hold an appropriate early years qualification at level 3.

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
