## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands the importance of self-evaluation to make continuous improvements to outcomes for children.
- The childminder has suitable resources and knows how to plan activities for children's individual learning needs and interests.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working in partnership with parents and other professionals, to help provide continuity for children's care and learning.
- The childminder has completed mandatory training, such as a first-aid qualification to help her attend to any accidents or emergencies. She knows the safeguarding procedures to follow if she has concerns for a child to protect their welfare.
- The childminder recognises the importance of helping children to lead a healthy lifestyle, such as daily exercise to support children's physical development.
- The childminder knows how to help children behave well. She explains that she will teach children to share, be considerate and respect others.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector had a tour of the areas of the home used for childminding and discussed the childminder's self-evaluation.
- The inspector and the childminder discussed the resources and equipment that she intends to use to support children's learning and development.
- The inspector viewed the childminder's safeguarding policy and procedures, and discussed her knowledge of safeguarding and the welfare requirements.
- The inspector looked at relevant documentation, such as the childminder's paediatric first aid certificate and public liability insurance.
- The inspector checked evidence of the suitability of the childminder and adult members of the household.
