This inspection

The effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection

This home has not yet had a full inspection. At this interim inspection the home was **not judged**.

This was the home's first inspection. There are no children or young people living in the home at present. This interim inspection focuses on whether the children's home meets its statutory requirements in order to maintain its registration and is ready to accept placements.

The provider is currently recruiting a new staff team. Once this is completed, referrals will be considered. Statutory recording mechanisms, policies and procedures remain in place. The home is in good order, with high-quality fixtures and fittings. It is furnished and decorated throughout to a very high standard, with children's bedrooms all having en suite facilities.

Independent visits must be undertaken, even when there are no children in placement. This will enable both the provider and the regulator to be fully satisfied that the home remains in the good order described above.



Information about this children's home

This is a privately run children's home. It is registered to provide care and accommodation for up to two young people with emotional and/or behavioural difficulties.

In addition the inspectors have tried to understand what the children's home knows about how well it is performing, how well it is doing and what difference it is making for the children and young people who it is trying to help, protect and look after.
