Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is good

- Children are happy and settled in this warm and welcoming club, and are developing secure emotional attachments with staff.
- Children behave well. Relationships between staff and children provide a good model for children to learn about how to behave.
- Children are developing an understanding of healthy lifestyles as they enjoy nutritious breakfasts and engage in discussions with staff about the importance of eating well.
- The club builds strong relationships with parents and the host school. Parents are complimentary about the club and the care provided.
- Staff members use good teaching skills and regularly praise and encourage children to have a go at activities. This helps to build up children's confidence and self-esteem.
- Children are cared for in a safe and secure environment. Staff complete daily checks to identify any potential hazards, and minimise risks to children's health and well-being.

It is not yet outstanding because:

- Sometimes there are missed opportunities to help young children to make their own decisions about what they would like to play with.
- The club do not regularly involve parents in evaluating the service provided.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

- improve on opportunities to help young children to make decisions for themselves to further promote their confidence and self-esteem
- provide parents with consistent opportunities to contribute their views to selfevaluation and use these to help drive improvements.

Inspection activities

- The inspector looked at areas of premises that are used by the club, including the outdoor area.
- The inspector discussed the activities available with the manager and observed activities.
- The inspector looked at a sample of policies, risk assessments and children's records.
- The inspector looked at questionnaires and letters which reflected parents' views.
- The inspector spoke to staff members and children at appropriate times throughout the inspection.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. Staff are fully aware of the signs of abuse and understand the importance of reporting any concerns. The premises are safe and well maintained. Written risk assessments are completed, which helps to minimise any risks. Policies and procedures are comprehensive and implemented well and recruitment procedures are extremely robust. Regular supervision sessions for all staff provide opportunities for guidance and support, when required. Staff are dedicated in their ongoing pursuit of training and the benefits this brings to children's learning. Self-evaluation is focused to improve outcomes for children. The club has developed close links with the host school to support children as they move through school and complement their learning. Effective information is shared with parents through daily discussion and informative noticeboards.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

The club provides a broad selection of resources and activities that children of different ages and abilities enjoy. These provide the children with opportunities to have fun in a stimulating learning environment. Staff members support children well. For example, they display genuine interest in the children, listening and responding to them and engaging fully in their play. Children show high levels of concentration, determination and perseverance. They display good communication skills as they describe the models they construct. Younger children become engrossed in imaginative play using the small-world resources and make good progress as they continue to develop their creative and writing skills, using different crayons to colour favourite characters with precision. These activities all help to extend children's learning, supporting them to make good progress in their overall development.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children behave well. They listen and follow instructions and learn to share, take turns and work together. For example, while using the computer games, children are extremely supportive of one another. They skilfully negotiate between themselves to ensure all get equal access and choice. Older and younger children play cooperatively together. Staff are calm and responsive to each of the children's individual needs, responding to them with warmth and affection. This helps to promote children's emotional well-being. The environment is welcoming and resources are, generally, readily accessible to children. Children enjoy freshly prepared food at breakfast time, such as cereal, toast and fresh drinking water. This helps to prepare them for their busy school day and contributes towards their understanding of a healthy lifestyle. Children learn to keep themselves and others safe, as they tidy away to ensure safe, clear floor space. They sensibly move around the premises, supported well through staff's close supervision and guidance.
