Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder knows and understands how children learn. She understands the importance of assessing and monitoring children's progress, including completing the required check for children between the ages of two and three years. She knows how to prepare children for the next step in their education.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working closely with parents and other settings that children attend, to enable consistency of care and learning for children.
- The childminder knows how to support children's well-being and establish positive relationships that help children to settle in. She understands how to manage children's behaviour to help them learn to share, take turns and be respectful of each other.
- The childminder understands the importance of maintaining children's good health and of encouraging their understanding of healthy lifestyles. She knows the need to provide the children with daily opportunities outdoors and for physical activity.
- The childminder has a thorough knowledge of safeguarding issues and understands how to deal with any concerns regarding children's welfare.
- The childminder understands the importance of reviewing her practice, such as by seeking parents' views, to make changes and help improve outcomes for children.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder her understanding of the requirements of the early years foundation stage and how she intends to meet these when children attend in the future.
- The inspector and the childminder looked at the areas and resources available for children's use.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she would deliver the educational programmes when caring for children and undertake observation, assessment and planning.
- The inspector looked at and discussed a range of records, policies and procedures with the childminder.
- The inspector discussed safeguarding procedures and how the childminder intends to keep children safe.

The childminder registered in 2011. She lives in Plumstead, in the London Borough of Greenwich. She provides cares all year round, Monday to Friday, except for family holidays. There were no children in the early years age range on roll at the time of the inspection.
