## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder knows how to safeguard children's welfare. She is aware of child protection issues and the correct procedures to follow if she has concerns.
- The childminder knows how to monitor children's learning and development and secure appropriate interventions, so that children receive the support they need. She recognises the benefits of sharing information with parents and other professionals to meet children's individual needs.
- The childminder knows how to enhance children's learning in all areas. She has a range of resources to support children's development and help them progress.
- The childminder is aware of how to raise children's awareness of healthy lifestyles, such as providing them with healthy snacks, meals and regular physical exercise.
- The childminder reflects on her practice to identify areas for improvement, for example, she has plans to increase improve the selection of multi-cultural resources.
- The childminder knows how to organise the learning environment well to allow children to choose resources and where they want to play.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## **Inspection activities**

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to support children's learning and development.
- The inspector looked at a range of documents, which included the childminder's policies and procedures, certificates and systems for recording information.
- The inspector looked at the space available for childminding and some of the resources she intends to use.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder to assess her knowledge of the early years foundation stage.
