Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- The provider, who is also the manager, has failed to take sufficient action to improve the provision since the last inspection. She fails to ensure that all safeguarding and welfare requirements of the early years foundation stage and associated requirements of the Childcare Register are met. This compromises children's well-being.
- The provider fails to ensure that there is at least one member of staff with a current paediatric first-aid certificate on the premises and available at all times when children are present.
- The provider does not implement suitable arrangements for the supervision of staff. She does not work effectively with staff to identify ways to improve their practice or the provision.
- The staff team does not plan suitable activities that build on children's interests. Not all children engage in purposeful play. They become bored and their behaviour deteriorates.
- Partnerships with other settings children attend are poor and those with parents are not good. The provider fails to share relevant information with others involved in children's care to ensure their individual needs are met.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

Safeguarding is ineffective. Although two members of staff have current paediatric first-aid training, both go off the premises to collect children from schools leaving no first-aider on site with a group of children. This is a breach of requirements and compromises children's well-being. This was raised as a significant weakness at the last inspection but the provider has not taken any action in response. Self-evaluation is not effective. The provider has failed to identify more breaches of requirements and weaknesses in the provision. Staff attend safeguarding training to help them be alert to any signs that a child may be at risk of harm and know how to report any concerns. However, the provider does not coach and mentor staff adequately to support where practice can be improved, and to raise the quality of children's experiences. The provider undertakes daily risk assessments of the premises to help minimise hazards to children's safety.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is inadequate

Staff gain basic information about children's needs from parents when they first start; however they do not exchange information with teaching staff at schools they attend. This hinders staff's ability to offer appropriate continued support and to complement children's experiences in school. The staff team does not plan suitable activities that build on children's interests. The activities on offer do not engage all children in purposeful play. For example, during the inspection, some children did not want to join in the planned cooking or sewing activities and showed no interest in the other resources set out. This led to high noise levels and children became restless, which had a negative effect on some children's behaviour. Children who chose to play outside had some positive group play experiences. They played games, negotiating space, working as a team, sharing and taking turns.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

Children's welfare is compromised by the poor first-aid arrangements. Although children arrive happily, some children soon become bored and their behaviour deteriorates. Opportunities for children and their parents to visit the club prior to their placement enable them to familiarise themselves with the routines of the club. However, staff do not obtain enough information about their key children from parents or school staff to support them and provide continuity of care. Children know to wash their hands before they eat, to reduce the risk of cross-infection. They have opportunities to play outside. Children develop their coordination and other physical skills, for example, as they kick and throw balls.
