## Summary of key findings for parents

#### This provision is good

- The childminder is warm, experienced and uses a wide range of teaching techniques to encourage children to think, talk, explore and play.
- The childminder is caring and consistent with children. Children are effectively encouraged and supported to be independent and confident.
- The quality of teaching is good, overall. The childminder is a good role model for children. She explains and demonstrates how to do things to develop children's understanding and skills.
- The childminder has many effective ways to share relevant information with parents. She informs parents about how their child is developing and encourages them to share what their child does at home.
- The childminder makes good use of self-evaluation procedures to reflect on the quality of her work. She proactively seeks the views of parents, children and other professionals to help her set plans for further development.
- Children are eager, happy learners. They listen and behave well and have warm and positive relationships with the childminder and each other.

## It is not yet outstanding because:

At times, the childminder does not make very good use of what she knows about children to help them build on what they already know and can do.

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## What the setting needs to do to improve further

#### To further improve the quality of the early years provision the provider should:

■ make better use of information about children to plan activities that build on what they already know and can do and help them to make even more rapid progress.

#### **Inspection activities**

- The inspector observed the quality of teaching during activities indoors and outdoors, and assessed the impact this has on children's learning.
- The inspector completed a joint evaluation of an activity with the childminder.
- The inspector held a number of discussions with the childminder. She looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of persons living in the household.
- The inspector spoke to children during the inspection.
- The inspector took account of the views of parents through written feedback provided.

## **Inspection findings**

#### Effectiveness of the leadership and management is good

The childminder has a secure knowledge of how children learn, overall. She plans an exciting programme of activities covering all areas of learning. Children's development is regularly assessed and monitored in partnership with parents. The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. The childminder has a good understanding of safeguarding issues and the possible signs of abuse. She has a clear understanding of the procedures to follow if she has any concerns about a child's welfare. The childminder conducts effective risk assessments and maintains clear records required for children's safety. She ensures her assistants have appropriate training and supervises their work. The childminder is undertaking training to improve her teaching and outcomes for children. She obtains required consents from parents and keeps them well informed about her practice.

### Quality of teaching, learning and assessment is good

Children are developing good communication skills. The childminder gives them good opportunities to talk, think and share their ideas. She asks children simple and complex questions to help them clarify their thoughts and extend their understanding. For instance, she asks if their Christmas trees were recycled or not, what do dinosaurs eat and talks about fossils. Children thrive on the high-quality conversations. The childminder teaches children words and numbers. She encourages them to match colours. Children confidently name colours when choosing bowls or cups and when playing with bricks. They talk about size naturally in play. For instance, they describe the size of bananas and their favourite superheroes. The childminder successfully organises her resources for children to easily reach toys they want to play with. Children happily chatter to themselves and others.

## Personal development, behaviour and welfare are good

Children play and share resources well. They happily share magnifying glasses to search for hidden pictures. They demonstrate a good understanding as they put one aside for another child to use when they wake up. Children are developing good physical and self-care skills. They play safely and actively indoors. Children use their imagination as they press buttons, push cars and dance to music. They have a good attitude to fresh air and exercise. Children talk about the weather and anticipate the fun they will have playing in the rain and snow. The childminder makes sure children are appropriately equipped to play safely in all weathers. Children demonstrate control as they pour a drink of milk from a small jug. The childminder gives children good opportunities to practise their skills. They follow consistent routines for good hygiene and healthy eating. Children know to sit still and eat and let the childminder know when they have had enough. Children learn about the wider world and their local community in planned activities and outings.

## **Outcomes for children are good**

Children make good progress in their learning given their individual starting points. They are motivated and confident communicators. Children know how to behave and listen well to stories. They are developing good physical and self-care skills. Children enjoy using their imagination and practising and extending their knowledge. They are well equipped and prepared for the next stage in their learning.
