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The effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection

This home was judged **requires improvement** at the full inspection. At this interim inspection Ofsted judge that it has **sustained effectiveness**.

The home appears more settled and there have been fewer incidents in the last two months. Two of the young people who were present during the last inspection have now left the home. The first young person has moved into supported accommodation and the second young person has moved onto a different placement because his needs could not be safely met at the home. The manager has identified learning from these placements that includes greater scrutiny around the matching process. There has been one new admission to the home. After an initial challenging period the young person appears more settled and told me, 'It's not so bad here. The staff are really nice.'

Since the home's, last inspection the number of young people missing from care have reduced. Physical restraint is rare because staff focus on de-escalation and distraction techniques. All incidents are monitored and evaluated effectively.

Young people continue to attend a variety of educational settings dependent on their needs and abilities. Staff are proactive in sourcing educational opportunities for young people struggling to engage in formal education.

The manager continues to ensure that young people have detailed health plans and are registered with the relevant primary healthcare services such as doctors, dentists and opticians. This ensures that their physical health is maintained. Young people have access to the services that they need to promote their emotional and psychological well-being. Medication is stored safely, and records on the administration of medication are appropriately maintained.

The manager continues to support young people to maintain regular contact with their families which includes regular visits home and telephone calls. This allows young people to maintain their sense of belonging in their families.

Staff complete regular health and safety checks and follow a range of safety procedures to protect young people from potential hazards. This includes fire drills and emergency evacuations, to ensure that young people know what to do in case of an emergency. In addition, the vetting and recruitment of people working at the



home is thorough to make sure that only suitable adults work there.

The home continues to be managed by a suitably qualified manager who has been in post since March 2014. Staff receive regular training to help ensure that they have the skills and competencies necessary to meet the diverse needs of the young people. Staff also continue to receive regular formal supervision and appraisal.

The manager has ensured that most of the requirements and recommendations from the last inspection have been met. This is evident in the notifications sent to Ofsted regarding serious incidents, the reduced number of missing from home incidents, the use of return home interviews, improved matching processes and the employment of new regulation 44 visitors. However, there has not been sufficient progress in ensuring that risk assessments are detailed and relevant to young people, and some staff have yet to complete their level 3 diploma, which means they are now outside regulatory timescales. These two requirements are repeated.



Information about this children's home

The home is one of four within this private organisation. The home offers placements for up to five young people who may have a combination of mental health, psychological, emotional or complex care needs that present challenging behaviour. The service is designed to offer medium- to long-term care placements.

Information about this inspection

Inspectors have looked closely at the experiences and progress of children and young people living in the children's home. Inspectors considered the quality of work and the difference that adults make to the lives of children and young people. They read case files, watched how professional staff work with children, young people and each other and discussed the effectiveness of help and care given to children and young people. Wherever possible, they talked to children, young people and their families. In addition, the inspectors have tried to understand what the children's home knows about how well it is performing, how well it is doing and what difference it is making for the children and young people whom it is trying to help, protect and look after.

This inspection focused on the effectiveness of the home and the progress and experiences of children and young people since the most recent full inspection.

This inspection was carried out under the Care Standards Act 2000 to assess the effectiveness of the service and to consider how well it complies with the Children's Homes (England) Regulations 2015 and the 'Guide to the children's homes regulations including the quality standards'.



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
