Summary of key findings for parents

This provision is inadequate

- Staff do not have an adequate knowledge or secure enough understanding of safeguarding issues. The designated officer for safeguarding and staff have not attended appropriate safeguarding training. These weaknesses compromise children's safety and well-being.
- Performance management and professional development for staff do not focus enough on improving the quality of teaching. Leaders do not closely check the quality of staff's practice.
- Staff do not have a thorough understanding of how to consistently support children's communication and language development effectively, in order to help them make the best possible progress.
- Staff do not always give children enough opportunities to actively direct and develop their own creative learning experiences. They occasionally step in too quickly to show children how to do things.

It has the following strengths

- Staff have a caring nature and know the children's characteristics well. Children build strong attachments to the staff, which helps them to settle.
- Parents are involved in their children's learning. They are invited into the playgroup to share their knowledge and support activities. Parents are given ideas about how to enhance their children's learning at home.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

provide more opportunities for children to develop their own skills and be able to express their own creative ideas.

Inspection activities

- The inspector spoke to the children and staff at appropriate times throughout the inspection. She held discussions with the manager, deputy manager and the chairperson.
- The inspector observed the quality of teaching and assessed the effect this had on children's learning.
- The inspector spoke to parents on the day and took their views into account.
- The inspector checked evidence of staff's suitability and qualifications. She discussed with the manager staff's supervision and training and the playgroup's action plan for future improvements.
- The inspector completed a joint observation with the manager.

Inspection findings

Effectiveness of the leadership and management is inadequate

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective. The manager and staff do not have an up-to-date knowledge of safeguarding issues, in order to effectively support children's welfare. Some staff are unsure of their responsibilities with regards to whistle-blowing procedures and what to do if there is an allegation made against a member of staff. Some staff do not confidently demonstrate they know the signs that children may be at risk of harm. Nevertheless, the manager has updated the playgroup's safeguarding policy to ensure it reflects local procedures. She also makes regular checks through the Disclosure and Barring Service to help ensure the ongoing suitability of staff. Recruitment procedures are appropriate and help ensure new staff are suitable for their roles. The manager carries out supervision and appraisals with staff as part of their performance management. However, arrangements are not rigourous enough to fully identify ways to improve the quality of teaching. The manager uses self-evaluation to identify some areas to improve.

Quality of teaching, learning and assessment requires improvement

Staff are well qualified and understand that children learn through play. They set up the playroom with a range of activities to promote learning. However, the quality of teaching is not consistently good. Some staff do not respond to children's emerging needs or guide their language development. They do not make the most of opportunities to extend and develop children's language skills. Furthermore, during creative activities, staff often tell children what to and do not give them enough opportunities to explore and express their own ideas. Staff establish children's starting points on entry. They regularly observe and assess children's progress and identify their next steps in learning. They use this information to help them plan for children's future progress.

Personal development, behaviour and welfare are inadequate

The weaknesses in staff's safeguarding awareness reduces their ability to ensure children's welfare and safety. Nevertheless, children are settled and approach staff when they need help. They learn about healthy lifestyles and are well behaved. Staff teach children the playgroup's rules so they learn about behavioural expectations and to value each other. Children have an understanding of similarities and differences. They enjoy learning about different cultural backgrounds. For example, they learn about how children celebrate New Year in China. Children play outdoors and develop their physical skills. The premises are safe and staff carry out appropriate risk assessments. They record any accidents children have and meet their dietary needs, as required. The move on to school is managed well so that children feel comfortable with change.

Outcomes for children require improvement

Some children are working comfortably within the range typical for their age. However, the inconsistent support for children in developing their communication and language skills means that they are not consistently making good progress. Children enjoy their freely chosen play and are gaining independence and a positive attitude to learning. Older children are motivated and enjoy whole-group teaching times, such as story time. They develop some useful skills in readiness for school.
